

Wallace Beery In "Viva Villa," Big Hit At Torrance

"Viva Villa," which opened last night and continues through Saturday at the Torrance Theatre with Wallace Beery starred, takes its place among the truly great pictures of all time.

Prices have been dropped as much as \$50.00 on units in the Chevrolet line.
