Democrats Lead In Registration In L. A. County

Nearly 30,000 Majority Shown by Records of Registrar

With hundreds of new registrations coming in daily from every community in the county and with hundreds more changing their affiliation from other parties to the Democratic ranks, indications were today that the county's total registration would reach a new high mark next week, or possibly this week.

The county's total registration as of June 4, when the last count was made, was 1,235,096, according to the report on file today with the Registrar.

As predicted, the Democrats now lead the county, for the first time in its history. The majority was declared in the registrar of voter's statement to be 26,841. A sudden spurt last week in May recorded a gain of 27,900 for the Democrats, while the regular Friday night reports of Registrar W. M. Kerr had previously shown the Democrats to be gaining, mostly at the expense of the Republicans, at the rate of but several thousand a week.

Here is how the eight political parties stand by Kerr's latest count: Republican, 556,823; Democratic, 538,664; Socialist, 6,234; Prohibition, 6,194; Liberty, 903; Progressive, 320; Commonwealth, 339; Communist, 257.

Those declining to state their political affiliation totaled 80,362. Democrats lead the Republicans by 48,319 in Los Angeles city, but the C. P. still holds the lead in the total of registrations in the unincorporated area and the cities outside the metropolitan city. Even this lead is dwindling, however.



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
