Firestone Report Trade Conditions Very Favorable

Rubber Industry Pays High Wage Rate, Firestone Co. Increase 30 Percent

AKRON, Ohio, June 20.—Harvey S. Firestone, chairman of the Firestone Tire & Rubber Co., made the following report today regarding wages, profits and sales in his company during the past six months:

"Operations of the parent and all subsidiary companies, including Firestone Service Stores, for the six months ending April 30, 1934, after deducting depreciation, interest, Librarian development expenditures and federal taxes, resulted in a profit of \$1,521,745. This compares with a loss of \$1,576,000 for the same period last year.

"During the past year we increased our wages 30 per cent. As published by the national industrial conference board in their May bulletin, the rubber industry pays the highest rate of wages of any industry not requiring apprentice period as illustrated below:

Lumber industry	47.1 cents
Agricultural implements	58.8 cents
Steel industry	60.2 cents
Automobiles	68.1 cents
Rubber	76.1 cents

"The average for all industries is 56.1 cents.

"The wages in the rubber industry are now higher than they were in the peak of 1929.

"During the first six months, our Akron payrolls showed an increase of 103 per cent compared with the same period last year. Our employment records show an increase of 63 per cent, or over 4,000 additional people on the payroll as against a year ago.

"Our dollar sales for the six months period show an increase of 58 per cent compared with the same period last year."

CANDIDATE



OAKLAND, June 21.—Bringing news of vastly increased use of the newspaper medium to advertise Chevrolet products during the next two months, C. P. Fiskien, ad-

vertising manager of the Chevrolet Motor Company, arrived here this week from Detroit.

Mr. Fiskien as at the big Chevrolet plant with Felix Doran, Jr., general sales manager of Chevrolet in charge of the western half of the United States and K. M. Chase, whose appointment as Pacific coast regional manager for the company is being announced. The Chevrolet advertising executive is investigating advertising requirements here to determine the program for the remainder of 1934 and to formulate local advertising plans for 1935.

"Chevrolet is the largest newspaper advertiser of all motor car manufacturers," he said upon his arrival here, "and the manner in which our advertising is placed and handled on the Pacific coast is of the utmost importance to us. This year we are using 5600 newspapers on our advertising schedule. This represents the major part of our advertising expenditure. "Inasmuch as Chevrolet advertising is based primarily on potential sales in any given locality, one of the largest expenditures will be on the Pacific coast as the popularity which Chevrolet has enjoyed on the coast for many years is constantly increasing. Chevrolet has led the industry in sales during five of the last seven years. Latest figures for sales up to and including May 20, show Chevrolet doing 146 per cent of the business it did during a like period in 1933. All this conclusively proves that Chevrolet's policy of using newspapers as a foundation for all of its advertising is a sound and good one."



Thirty Days Left To Register For August Primary

Residents of this community have less than 30 days in which to register if they wish to vote at the coming August primary election. W. M. Kerr, county registrar of voters, pointed out as a reminder today. Midnight, July 19, is the deadline.

Also on Tuesday, June 19, the county registrar of voters received from the secretary of state a notice designating all offices, except township, for which candidates are to be nominated at the primary, according to the state political code.

Names of the political parties qualified to participate in the election also were transmitted to the county registrar at that time. Within 10 days after receipt of this notice, Kerr will publish this information once each week for two successive weeks, in
