



Olympic II. Is Largest Fishing Barge In World

All-Iron Ship Built at Belfast, Ireland, in 1877 Has Long Career

HERMOSA BEACH.—There is little doubt in the mind of Capt. J. M. Andersen that his new fishing barge, Olympic II, is the largest ocean-fishing barge in the world.

The new Olympic II, is 258 feet long with a breadth of 38 feet. She has a depth of 22 feet 8 inches.

The all-iron ship was built at Belfast, Ireland, in 1877, by Messrs. Harland-Wolfe, for J. P. Corry & Co. of the Belfast Irish Free Trade.

The ship was taken from the stocks in '77 and was named Star of France, which name she carried until Andersen changed it to Olympic II.

The Olympic II, now Star of France, remained in the East India trade until 1888 when the J. J. Moore Company bought her for the Hawaiian sugar trade.

Two years after the Alaska Packers bought her, under whose flag she remained until she was converted into a fishing barge.

She is a sister-ship to the Star of Italy, and all during her long career was considered one of the finest ships afloat by sailormen the world over.

The Star of France was always noted for her speed and was one of the best for sailing vessels of her tonnage.

BIRDS ROOST UNDISPUTED IN SECOND SPOT AT END OF HALF

Fullerton's Surprise Defeat of Anaheim Removes All Rivals of Torrance as Runner-up; Oilers Win by Two-game Margin

With the aid of Huntington Beach and Fullerton, which pulled the big surprise in the night loop last Friday night, last week the Torrance Bluebirds moved into undisputed possession of the second shelf in the first half of the 1934 pennant race.

The Birds handed Olive a real trimming on Thursday night and shut them out, 11-0.

The Oilers downed Santa Ana, 5-3; Westminster furnished Long Beach with their 14th straight defeat, making it perfect score for the Admirals this half, and Fullerton upset Anaheim in a tight game, 1-0.

This leaves Huntington Beach as the winners of the first half with 11 wins and three defeats for a percentage of .785. Torrance won nine, lost five. Anaheim, Santa Ana, Olive and Westminster are tied for third place.

In the annals of night baseball there has probably never been a race like this one, when the winning or losing of one game could make so much difference in the final standing of the teams.

The Oilers finished the half only two games ahead of the runner-up, three games ahead of third place. Torrance has a one-game margin on the four third place clubs, and had they lost to Olive would have taken that team's place at third while Olive would have moved into second.

Murphy's boys got away to a good start developing the first two games of the season to Westminster and Huntington Beach. Olive nipped them twice and Santa Ana once, making five games lost in all which pulled them down into second spot.

However, the Birds did mighty well, considering the class of competition there is in the night loop this year.

Starting Tuesday, July 10, when the Birds meet Westminster, Murphy is going to make a strong bid for the championship. He now has some heavy hitters, and if they can keep up the pace they have been going there will be plenty of hardbarring for the rest of the season.

Fullerton and Long Beach, the two tail-end teams, may show some surprises in the next whirl, as both teams have been strengthened and the management of the Admirals has been switched to Beeson, first sacker, who has apparently instilled some life into his outfit. In fact the Admirals scored Westminster a score last Friday night by going into the third inning with a lead of 2 to 1.

Fuzzy Ferrington was called to the mound to relieve Hodson, and his pitching ability, coupled with a smashing rally in the fourth inning which gave the Aviators five runs, turned the tide.
