

Constitution And New Deal For The State

People Vote This Fall On Rawls' Proposal For New Document

A new constitution for California, with a "New Deal," proposed and advocated by Assemblyman John T. Rawls, was the subject of Mr. Rawls' radio address over KGMJ on Monday evening of last week, when he explained briefly the highlights of his resolution.

Mr. Rawls, who is a candidate to succeed himself as representative from the 68th district, is the author of this important measure, which if approved in November will provide the state with the means of ridding itself of some of the obnoxious features of the old constitution and adopting others more in keeping with modern times.

The old constitution, adopted in 1879, has become cumbersome and unwieldy. Drawn up to fit the needs of a mining and agricultural commonwealth it is now in a large measure obsolete. The new industrial and commercial development is hampered by attempts to fit old provisions to modern conditions.

Under the resolution drawn up by Mr. Rawls, which was passed and adopted by both houses of the state legislature during the 1933 session, the people of California will vote at the general election in November on the proposition to call a constitutional convention.

A majority for the proposition will set in motion the machinery for the election of delegates who will draw up a new constitution for California which will be more in keeping with the California moratorium law which prohibited sales under certain mortgages and deeds of trust for default in payments of principal until January 1, 1934, and thereby saved many home owners from the loss of their property.

He is also the author of the "Buy American" law under which all state purchases are required to be American-made goods, and of many other beneficial enactments. His record in the assembly is outstanding, in view of the fact that he was serving his first term, which presages that upon his return to the legislature he will be one of the foremost in proposing and bringing to enactment truly useful legislation.
