LAMB

Lamb, a favorite in many lands for years, has a universal appeal. Right now it is particularly in favor with the approach of warmer weather, and the up-to-date homemaker is searching for menus to lure family appetites yet shorten her hours in the kitchen. All of which makes lamb, because it is so tender and quickly cooked, the ideal summer meat.

A roast leg of lamb never seems to lose favor, especially when properly cooked—tender and juicy inside and brown and crusty on the outside—and when it comes to leftovers there are no difficulties whatever. There is nothing better than cold slices of lamb for cold meat platters or with a salad plate.

Remember, though, that lamb is an extremist—it must be either piping hot or thoroughly cold, for lukewarm lamb never made friends.

If you want a meal in a jiffy, serve broiled lamb chops for, no matter what the cut, they take no longer to cook than the pineapple slices and other fruit and vegetables you may have on the broiler pan. The rib and loin lamb chops are the best known, but there are others that are just as succulent and delicious. The shoulder chop, while not quite so good-looking as its fellows, is just as delicate in flavor, equally tender and because there is so much more meat on these chops, one is plenty for a

serving. There are also the Saratoga chops from which the bone has been removed, and the meat skewered together, thus eliminating any waste. The English chop, or the loin which still retains part of the kidney, is considered a great delicacy and is served by many families at festive breakfasts.

Any chop is good, but it is even better if brushed with French dressing or marinated in some of the dressing to which garlic has been added. Somehow this spicy dressing improves the deliciousness of the meat without destroying any of the distinctive lamb flavor.

A broiler meal that is especially easy to prepare and delicious to eat consists of:

Lamb chops (any cut).

Thick slices tomato, breaded and broiled.

Slices of pineapple dipped in butter and broiled.

French bread (heated).

Romaine with Roquefort dressing.

Fresh peaches and cream.

Coffee.
