

### New Stamps Caused Rush



## 77 Records Fall as Ab Jenkins Speeds More Than 3000 Miles in 24 Hours



Ab Jenkins, veteran speedster, shattered 77 world, international and A.A.A. speed records in his recent 24-hour run on the hot salt desert at Lake Bonneville, Utah. Jenkins is shown above hurtling through space at an average speed of 127.2 miles per hour including all stops for a distance of more than 3,000 miles, — through the black of the night, with temperatures as high as 120 degrees. The inset at the left shows workers on the desert. Previous to the run, holes on the course had been filled with crushed rock as hard as granite with knife-like edges. At the right Jenkins is shown receiving congratulations of his proud mother.

Just to keep the records straight the "big game" on the Coast is the one between the Stanfords and Californians.  
Lack Love  
It seems that Santa Clara and St. Mary's have no particular love for each other. Neither have the rival rooting sections. The coaches, respectively, Clipper Smith and from Notre Dame, hence they are on speaking terms.

## Bow and Arrow Hunter Bags Fine Buck In Mountain Area Saturday

Come, listen all you hunters who go into the mountains with a high-powered rifle and a sack full of steel-jacketed bullets, and hear a story of real skill in bringing down the game.  
Last Saturday, Ondus Hill, 1508 Anapola, and his friend, Kenyon Wilhelm, of Nipton, California, went into the mountains near Old Woman Spring, Rattlesnake Canyon, in the San Bernardino range, armed with bows and arrows. Wilhelm, who has been practicing longer than Hill, brought down a fine 130-pound buck as his prize, with an 80-yard shot, something many hunters can't do with a rifle.

Hill, who is better known to his Torrance friends as "Doc," wasted a couple of arrows on elusive bucks, and when finally a big 250-pounder hove in sight he tossed his bow away and grabbed his rifle. One bullet, well aimed, brought the big buck down. Rumor spread about the city when "Doc" returned home that he had killed the buck with an arrow, but Hill is a conscientious man, and to the reporter who called on him yesterday to hear the story, he modestly disclaimed any such exploit, and gave all the credit for such a unique kill to his partner, Wilhelm.

"However," he said, "the next time I go hunting I am going to leave the rifle at home and use the bow and arrow. If I get a deer it will have to be with that weapon."  
Hill's brother, Howard, an expert with the bow and arrow, is responsible for the interest in archery shown by both Wilhelm and "Doc." Howard Hill has slain many a deer, and other game with this primitive weapon. Even bears have fallen under his aim, as two huge skins in the home of his brother testify. One of these bears was killed with one shot, the other with two, and the animal, finally dropped with seven arrows in its body.

Howard Hill, whose home is in Miami, Florida, but who has done considerable big game hunting with the bow and arrow all over the western states, has been in Hollywood for some time past making a picture, "The Last of the Wyatt's," in which the wild life of America will be shown.
