The honking of taxicabs, the rumble of buses, the shrill whistles of gendarmes and other street noises are reproduced as a prelude to a colorful composition which introduces the apache dance of the Moulin de la Galette, the sensuous rumba of La Cubana, the cancan of the Bal Tabarin, the tango of the Cluif Casanova and the "Caressa" of Le Fetiche.
