The Torrance Chess Club is under the direct supervision of the Los Angeles county recreation department and holds regular meetings on Monday and Thursday evenings at the Recreation Center, 1318 Cabrillo avenue. Visitors are always most cordially welcome.

On Monday evening, October 29, a new chess club was formed at the Anderson Memorial in San Pedro. On this date the Torrance Chess Club visited the newly organized club in a body and experienced a very entertaining evening. The Torrance players made a very impressive showing by obtaining several wins from some of San Pedro's best players. Eighteen players in all were present.

Thirty-two faced Isaac Kaahana, the contender for the United States championship, in his exhibition at the Terminal Chess Club, one of Brooklyn's newest chess clubs devoted to the royal game. The international player, as usual, made a fine showing but did not escape unscathed. He won 24 of the games, five were drawn and three of his opponents defeated him.

In a recent correspondence game the writer had occasion to use an old but clever trap which is ever present in many forms of opening. The device graphically illustrates the error of playing the opening in premature attack with one's Queen. The rest of the game follows:

**A CHESS PRIMER**  
Lesson VI—  
The Pawn is the only piece which must always move forward. This it does one square at a time, with the exception of the first time it is moved, when it may be pushed forward one or two squares at the option of the player.

When the Pawn reaches the eighth rank, it may be exchanged for any other piece, with the exception of a King or a Rook. In other words it must be promoted for a piece of higher value. When a Pawn reaches the eighth rank it may be promoted to a Queen, although there may be another Queen already on the board. The Queen is the piece usually selected when promoting the Pawn, but as will be shown in future lessons, it may be necessary to choose another piece.

All the pieces, with the exception of the Pawn, capture in exactly the same way as they move. The Pawn, however, which moves forward, captures diagonally sideways. Thus a Pawn can take only when the opposing pieces or Pawns are adjoining.

About 400 years ago, the Pawn could move only one square even at the first move, but it was felt that the game would be improved by giving it the right of going forward two squares, for the purpose of giving quicker development. This additional privilege was acknowledged by all chess players to be a great improvement, but it was thought that it was rather unfair that a Pawn, which had reached the fifth rank, should lose its right of capturing the opponent's Pawn if the latter moved forward two squares. It was agreed, therefore, that if a Pawn reached the fifth rank, and an opposing Pawn passed it, the latter could be captured just as it could have been had the old arrangement been in force. The proviso was made, however, that this capture, which is known as "taking in passing" or "en passant," must be made immediately after the opposing Pawn has moved two squares, otherwise the privilege is lost.

Chairman Waters also says it is fitting to remember at this time that 297 American nurses died during the great World War. Jane A. Delano, in charge of Red Cross nursing service at the time, saved her life in the process.

A living memorial to Miss Delano and all the other nurses is maintained by the Red Cross through the enrollment of the Nurses' Reserve, the members of which are ready to serve in any emergency when called.

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## Lomita Sewer Work Done At Low Expense

Considerable Saving Noted In Completion of Work In Adjoining City

Several communities throughout the county today were reported to be considering the possibility of submitting new work projects to the SERRA, acceptable for the employment of the thousands of unemployed cases being taken over from the county.

It was learned today that two more of the seven sanitary sewer projects would be virtually completed this week, leaving two more to be finished. Units No. 3 and 4 of the Lennox system were 92 and 91 per cent completed, respectively, early this week.

Lomita Unit No. 2 was 67 per cent completed, and the Belleflower project, one of the largest thus far attempted was 50 per cent completed. Lennox Unit No. 2 was reported as completed this week.

## Battery Case Is Dismissed For Lack of Evidence

Harry Wallace, arraigned November 5 in the Lomita township justice court, on a charge of battery preferred by C. J. Wilson, was released when the case was dismissed for want of sufficient evidence. The alleged offense is said to have occurred on November 3 at The Bowers, a cafe in Harbor City. Wallace pleaded not guilty, and both sides being ready to proceed, was given an immediate trial which resulted in Wallace's dismissal.

On the same date, Laura Scott, arrested on a charge of petty theft which was alleged to have taken place on November 3 and at the same place, The Bowers, C. J. Wilson also being the complaining witness, pleaded not guilty and was given an immediate hearing. This case was also dismissed for want of evidence. The alleged offense involved the ownership of a small dog.

## Sciot Delegates Meet In Phoenix

Special train service is being arranged by Southern Pacific Company for November 14 to carry Southern California delegates to the convention of Sciotos at Phoenix, it was announced here today by Lawson Overman, district passenger agent, Southern Pacific Lines.

More than 300 delegates are expected to make the convention trip, with large groups from San Diego, Long Beach, Santa Monica, Ventura, Santa Barbara, San Bernardino, Pasadena and other cities.

It is planned to start the Sciotos special from Long Beach. It will be routed by way of Los Angeles, Colton and Yuma, where cars carrying the San Diego contingent will be added to the train. The return home is to be made on November 18.
