TARTARS DRAW HOLLYWOOD IN COLISEUM GRID CLASSIC

Marine League Champs Are Placed In Semi-Windup Spot On Program; Jordan and Belmont Will Kick Off Promptly At 1:30 O'Clock

The Torrance Tartars draw an enviable spot in the football carnival which will be held at the Los Angeles Coliseum next Wednesday afternoon, November 28, when they meet Hollywood in the semi-windup, next to the last pair of teams to take the field.

The complete list of opponents is as follows: Jordan vs. Belmont. South Gate vs. San Fernando. Gardena vs. Eagle Rock. Polytechnic vs. Roosevelt. Torrance vs. Hollywood. Manual Arts vs. Fairfax.

The game will consist of 20-minute periods, in which each pair of teams will take up the struggle from where its predecessors left off. The carnival is sponsored by the Los Angeles Tenth District Parent Teachers Association, and proceeds will go to the milk fund. A nominal price of admission will be charged.

Torrance, undefeated champions of the Marine League, and conquerors of the best team in the Pacific League, is honored by being placed well down in the list of contestants and the followers of the team confidently expect them to show up Hollywood, which is one of the top teams of its class.

The Tartar line-up for the game is announced by Coach Bernie Donahue includes Johnson, left end; Selby, left tackle; Bond, left guard; Richhart, center; C. Smith, right guard; McGinnis, right tackle; McPadden, right end; H. Smith, quarter; Javens, right half;

Watson, left half; Adzovich, full-back.

The boys came out of the South Gate game with numerous crimples. Grubbs, star center, is out with a broken leg. McPadden, has a torn muscle in addition to an old leg injury which laid him up in a hospital for months and which has only lately improved enough to allow him to play although it has bothered him all season. Acree and Watson also received leg injuries at South Gate and have been getting around on crutches.

Richhart, starting at center, is the only regular left to fill that position since the removal of Grubbs; but is expected to handle it well. Carl Paxman, end, has been groomed to take over the center spot in case of necessity, or will fill in at right end if McPadden is unable to play. Jordan and Belmont will kick off at 1:30 o'clock, and the game will probably last until five, and if not completed by that time probably will be called under the rules of the board of education athletic department which prohibits high school teams from prolonging their games until after sundown.

Speed Classic At Municipal Airport Dec. 16

Famous Pilots Enter 200-mile Race Over Course at Local Field

America's 1934 Automobile speed championship will be decided at the Los Angeles Municipal Airport, Sunday afternoon, December 16, when the world's greatest pilots meet in the 200-mile battle for the title and \$10,000 in prize money.

Louis Meyer, three times national champion and twice winner of the Indianapolis Speedway, was the first pilot to enter.

Fred Frame, also an Indianapolis victor and the man who holds all automobile speed records from 10 to 50 miles, was the second entrant.

Other famous men in the automobile racing world such as Al Gordon, Pacific coast champion; "Wild Bill" Cummings, winner at Indianapolis this year and the leader in the A.A.A. point system; Wilbur Shaw, Cliff Bergere, Rex Mays, Morrie Rose and all the leading pilots will be at the wheels of the big racing creations. A number of foreign entrants also will compete.

The race is limited to cars of 1934 championship or Indianapolis specifications and a mechanic will ride with each pilot.

Closed Season On Quail Is Ordered

In an emergency proclamation, Governor Frank F. Merriam has closed quail season in eight Southern California counties for the 1934 season, the state fish and game commission announced this week.

The counties in which shooting will be forbidden during the regular open season which began November 15 and continues for six weeks, are: Ventura, Inyo, Los Angeles, San Bernardino, Riverside, Orange, Imperial and San Diego.

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
