### Davenport Goes To The Missions For Next Season

#### Former Hurler For Lomita Merchants Gets Chance in League Company

Dave Davenport, former ace hurler for the Lomita Merchants, has been signed to play with the San Francisco Missions, and left this week for the north to play a few exhibition games with the San Francisco All Stars, before the opening of the regular baseball season.

Davenport was mainstay of the Lomita ball team when it was under the management of Ray Townsend. Last year he went to Catalina Island where he was given a tryout by the Chicago Cubs, but failed to get on there due to the fact that the Cubs had more recruits on the pitching staff than they needed.

Davenport's record for last season shows, out of 38 full games pitched, 35 won and three lost. He pitched 14 shut-out games and during the season struck out an average of 11 men per game. He has been playing this winter with the Hermosa club, under the management of Al Martz, and in his last 16 games it is claimed that he has allowed not more than three hits.

This is quite a record, but Davenport, when he was hurling for Lomita, showed a consistent ability to keep the hits down and the strike-out column well loaded. He ought to have a good season with the Missions, for his experience in the semi-pro field has given him a great deal of knowledge of the game.

#### Ray Sleppy, Class of 1927 and Johnny McFadden, Class of 1935 Are Greatest All-Around Athletes That Ever Attended Torrance High School

Last week when yours truly announced that he would pick the greatest all-around athlete that had ever attended Torrance high school he thought it was a snap. But found out different.

After spending hours and hours of looking back through the records and old annuals of the school I have arrived at who I think is the best. After checking and rechecking I have come to the conclusion that two boys are tied for the honor. These two boys are the greatest of all other great athletes of the local school. My selection for the greatest all-around athletes who ever attended Torrance high school are Ray Sleppy, '27, and Johnny McFadden, who will graduate in 1935.

I have seen nearly every varsity athletic contest of the school for 10 years and believe that I have picked the right boys. You can read and compare these authentic records given to me by the school, and I have checked with every annual that the school has ever printed or published. These records only include varsity letters and minor sports such as tennis and golf do not count. I also did not include minor letters for basketball. Below are the names and records of the greatest athletes that ever attended Torrance high school. These are records of the school.

Johnny has all ready earned one letter in basketball, 1932. One letter in track, 1934, and is a cinch for another this year. Two letters in football, 1934, and will surely make another this fall. Two letters in baseball, 1933-34, and is conceded another letter in this sport this spring. This will make nine major varsity letters for McFadden. Not bad.

Now for some of the highlights of each sport, and after reading them you will certainly agree with me that this boy has earned the title "the greatest all-around athlete of Torrance high school," along with Ray Sleppy.

### McFadden Injured

Johnny's life reads like one of Alger's books. While attending a Catholic school in Alhambra he represented the school in the Junior Olympic meet in Los Angeles. While in the eighth grade he ran the 100-yard dash in 10:2. This fast time is good for high school and college. He then attended Loyola high school and went out for football, making the lightweight team. During a game Johnny broke a leg, a compound fracture and the bone was pushed into the ground. They rushed him to the hospital, but lockjaw set in and he was laid up in the hospital for over eight months. The doctors said that he would never be able to walk again. A boy who had recently run the 100-yard dash in 10:2, Walt McFadden had other ideas and after spending nearly two years of being treated in the hospital he entered Torrance high school. The Irish in him won out and you have all ready read his great records in sports in the local school. Overcoming this handicap, Johnny would like to enter Loyola College next year after his high school days are over.

Slippy Great Athlete

Ray made two letters in football, one letter in varsity basketball, two in track, and four letters in baseball, making a total of 9 varsity letters. Ray also made three minor letters in basketball. Sleppy played forward on the championship lightweight basketball team of 1926, the first championship that a Torrance team ever won. This team early in the season beat the great Huntington Park lightweight team, which later in the year won the C. I. F. title. Torrance's team would have been the C. I. F. champs if they had been eligible to enter the playoffs.

Next year in 1937 Torrance produced under the coaching of E. A. Mitchell the greatest basketball player
