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Sportsmen Back The Passage of Sardine Bill

Conservation Measure Now Under Consideration By Assembly

SAN FRANCISCO—California sportsmen are assembling full strength, prepared to throw united force into the battle to pass the sardine bill, known as A. B. 950, introduced by Assemblyman Fisher of Oakland. With near-depletion of ocean gamey fish threatened the Fish & Game Development Association and its 74 affiliated clubs throughout the state have made the passage of the sardine bill one of their major legislative issues and will fight for its adoption. L. I. Herrington, executive secretary of the association has pointed out.

The bill was passed out of the assembly fish and game committee last Tuesday with a "do pass" recommendation. It was made a special order of business for yesterday. The bill makes it unlawful for commercial fishermen to take sardines to any fishing reduction plant except under permit, violations of the law resulting in forfeiture of license and tackle.

Governor Merriam and the administration have pledged themselves to support the bill. The governor, speaking on a coast radio chain, stressed the fact that destruction of a natural resource would not be compensated and these plants must operate within the jurisdiction of the state. Conservationists hope the governor will support the bill on the floor.

GARDENA MAN arrested on horse THEFT CHARGE

Ira Sprague, 16511 South St. Andrew street, Gardena, was arrested by sheriff's deputies of the farm detail, March 23, on a charge of grand theft preferred by Mike Cruz, 1774 East 105th street. Sprague is accused of taking a bay mare colt belonging to Cruz from a pasture without the owner's knowledge.

Cruz and L. P. Salque, who had sold the colt to Cruz, went to Sprague on the pretext of wanting to buy a horse, and identified the colt as Cruz's property. Another witness, who saw the colt loaded onto a trailer, gave a description which is said to fit Sprague, who is said to own a car and trailer similar to that on which the colt had been carried away. Sprague claimed the colt came to his place and was taken up as a stray.


