
water rates. In the interest of economy and cheaper water the \$170,000 grant should be returned to the Federal Government inasmuch as the City of Torrance must repay the Government some \$128,000.00 with interest, and the approximate 1300 water users in Water District No. 1, who own a number of acres to justify the expenditure of \$400,000, and a \$200,000 water system is adequate. That said councilmen have been requested not to spend this additional money but persist in their plans. That in the near future Torrance will receive water through its membership in the Metropolitan Water System, and about to be approved by said Councilmen will be a total waste of money. That the water bonds were voted by the people before the depression, and the people of Torrance do not sanction this needless expenditure.

2. That expenditures hitherto made by said Councilmen on said water system have been extravagant, and said Councilmen approved the purchase of land from the C. C. M. O. company at an exorbitant price.

3. That through the Street Superintendent, said councilmen have allowed favoritism to exist, and have employed non-residents for work in preference to Torrance men.

4. That said councilmen have adopted a dictatorial attitude in office, have refused to listen to the people's wishes through petition, and otherwise.
