

Los Angeles National Housing Exposition Opens

Housing Act Loans Aiding Employment

How loans made by Bank of America under the National Housing Act have aided employment in California is explained in an advertisement published this week in newspapers throughout the state. Up to May 1, the bank has made housing loans in the total amount of \$5,667,000. According to bank officials, 55 percent of this amount has been paid for labor engaged directly in building, repairing and modernizing California homes. An additional amount went to provide the materials and supplies used in construction.

Commenting on the showing, L. M. Giannini, president of Bank of America, said, "Our survey shows that through housing loans made by our bank, 3,564,000 man-hours of employment have been created. This is particularly gratifying to us as one of Bank of America's principal considerations in engaging in statewide activities in cooperation with the Federal Housing Administration was to stimulate employment as the principal necessity for business recovery."

Bank of America's advertisement, which is one of a series supporting the Federal Housing Program, shows that the bank's loans to date have resulted in the following proportions of man-hours of employment among the building trades: Tile setters, 75,000; iron workers, 16,000; electricians, 79,000; carpenters, 608,000; plasterers, 292,800; bricklayers, 163,200; plumbers, 264,400; laborers, 1,155,000; painters, \$15,000, and roofers, 105,000.

142-Year-Old House Razed

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C. (U.P.)—A 142-year-old landmark has been torn down here. It was a nine-room house built in 1793 by Romelus Tesh. Its timbers, all hand hewn, were reported "remarkably preserved."

RICHMOND, Va. (U.P.)—There were nine marriages for every divorce in Virginia during 1934. It has been reported by Dr. W. A. Plecker, state registrar of vital statistics. Marriages totalled 30,657—divorces, including annulments, 3,540.



Seeks to Aid Dairy Farmers

Employees of the Safeway organization in Southern California will become "big butter and egg men" this week when the grocery company puts on a giant campaign to aid dairymen and poultry raisers. The event is a feature of Safeway's annual "Grower-Consumer" program, in which the company uses modern advertising and merchandising methods to help move surpluses and thus pave the way for greater incomes for producers. The dairy industry, particularly, is said to be facing an unsatisfactory condition at this time, the average value of a milk cow having dropped from \$83.99 in 1929 to \$27.09 in 1934 (latest national figures available).


