### Storm Drain to Serve Keystone Is Applied For

**Flat Lands South of Carson Flooded in Rainy Season**

Application will be made to the L. A. C. R. A. by County Surveyor Alfred Jones for the necessary labor and material for the construction of a storm drain in territory adjacent to Torrance, between Vermont and Normandie avenues on the east and west, 223rd street on the south and Carson street on the north.

Surveyor Jones stated that during the rainy season the land and roads are covered with storm water with no outlet except a small pipe far under the capacity needed. The condition can be relieved by the construction of a drain 24 inches in diameter, from 120th street northward to Nigger Slough.

The L. A. C. R. A. have a rule that they will not approve a project in which the material cost is more than 25 percent of the labor cost, which percentage would be exceeded on this job. However, Surveyor Jones thinks there is a possibility of the rules being changed shortly so he requested authority to prepare the necessary plans and specifications and submit the application. The supervisors acted favorably on the request.

The supervisors recently were petitioned by a group of property owners and residents of the district, and the petition was referred

### Demonstration of Prison Life Will Be Given Sunday

**Chaplain Platt of Whittier Lectures On "Does Crime Pay?"**

Next Sunday night, June 23, at the Christian church, Chaplain F. L. Platt of Whittier, will give an educational demonstration of the inside working of a prison. Chaplain Platt has spent 20 years of his life in prison work. His subject, "Does Crime Pay?" will be presented in connection with the demonstration. Mr. Platt is bringing a young man with him who will take the place of the prisoner. He will be brought in handcuffed, recaptured, searched, measurements taken, finger printed, photographed, given a number, placed in the death cell and the "death watch" placed before his door. He will explain the finger print system, the photograph, and show how impossible it is to escape with our present system of communication, etc. He will show the method of handling prison mail, how "dope" is smuggled to the prisoner. Then the young man will be taken out of his cell and the straps put on him, and as he is led on the platform, the 15 fatal "C. M. O. D. I. E. S." will then be adjusted and the black cap drawn over his head just as in real prison life. Mr. Platt will bring all the prison paraphernalia with him including the handcuffs, a noose, the black cap, the death cell and the gallows.

Commenting on the special program, Rev. Elder said: "Here is a lecture and a demonstration that every boy and girl, every young man and young woman, should hear and see."  
Chief "Jerry" Calkin will have a part in the demonstration. Members of the local police force and city employees will be the guests of honor. All are cordially invited to attend this unique service. A silver offering will be taken to defray expenses of the talent.
