Poster Contest For Business Women's Week

Annual Competition Open to Men and Women With Art Training

Business and Professional women in 1500 clubs throughout the United States will take part in the annual Poster Contest of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc., which has opened this week. Dr. Florence May Morse of Los Angeles, California, National Public Relations Chairman, and Carol Willis Hyatt of Chicago, Illinois, National Publicity Chairman, whose committees jointly arranged the contest are asking for a poster which will typify the modern American business woman and dramatize her significance in the business world.

The award will be a prize of \$50.00 and the contest will close December 1. The judges including distinguished New York artists, will admit in competition only those posters which have won a first prize or an honorable mention in state contests. Non-members as well as members are eligible and men as well as women who have had, or are having specific art training in art schools or the art departments of schools or colleges may compete. Girls and boys under 15 years of age are barred from the competition.

The contest rules as announced by the committee are as follows:

1. Contestants may submit more than one poster each if they so desire.
2. The poster may be done in any medium.
3. The design should be bold and simple, with no graduation of tone or intermixture of color.
4. The poster should contain the following lettering in any plain type: Business Women's Week, March 15-31, 1936.
5. The entry submitted must be of such proportions that it will increase or reduce to a poster measuring 11 inches in width by 17 inches in height.
