Wrestling Show

Attracts Large Crowd to High School Gym Friday; Proceeds For Welfare

The pick of the southern Pacific section was represented in the second annual P. T. A. wrestling tournament benefit held at the Torrance high school gymnasium last Friday night. A capacity crowd watched the bouts and got a big thrill out of the fast and scientific exhibitions. The bouts ranged from the 125-pound to the heavyweight division, with members of the Hollywood Athletic Club, Inglewood American Legion Wrestling Club, Los Angeles A. C., 160th Infantry, navy and U. C. L. A. students taking part.

The big bout of the evening was the match between Conrad Caldwell, national champion in the 191-pound division, former Olympic team member, and Schizler of the Inglewood club. Schizler disposed of Milas of the L. A. A. C., while Caldwell defeated Hart of the U. S. S. Nevada in the preliminary bouts. Caldwell pinned the Inglewood man to take the decision in the final.

Great Field Expected to Enter Santa Anita Handicap February 22

When nominations close on December 2 for the \$112,500 Santa Anita Handicap to be run February 22, the Los Angeles Turf Club predicts even a larger and more brilliant list of candidates than was the case this time last year.

The prediction is based on the nominations already being made and from a check made on the eligibles with the leading stables that have applied for and been granted stalls. The outstanding horses being considered are:

Perhaps all the above will not be named, but it is known that there will be many others to be added. It costs the owners \$100 to nominate and naturally the majority wait until the closing date. The next move will then be to announce the weights on December 18 and there's a \$250 fee to enter on February 21, and an additional \$750 to start on the day of the race.

Stall occupancy at Santa Anita Park is on the increase with arrivals by train and motor van a daily occurrence. However, the big shipments will not be on until the Maryland season closes the end of the month, and Arlington Downs, Texas, finishes up on November 20. The training season has started and is in full force in preparation for the opening of the season Christmas Day.

The annual police and firemen's boxing and wrestling show and hi jinks program, sponsored by the California Police and Firemen's Protective Association, will be held at the Culver City boxing arena next Monday evening, November 25. Six boxing bouts and two wrestling matches will be staged with Austin, Lieut. Jack Kennedy as referee and Vernon Dent, movie actor, as announcer. The Three Stooges in person will furnish entertainment. Tickets for the affair are being sold here by the local police and firemen.

Loyola Frosh Meet Compton On Turkey Day

Final Grid Tilt For Jaycees Held On Tartar Field

In its final gridiron tilt of the season, Gordon Clark's Compton Junior College eleven clashes with the powerful Loyola University freshmen on the Tartar's field Thanksgiving Day. The two teams have both piled up impressive records and will go onto the gridiron conceded even chances of victory. The game will start at 2 p. m.

The biggest feather in the Lion Babes' cap was a sensational 18-13 victory over the powerful Glendale eleven decisively most of the way and its victory was a stunning blow to Western Division Conference prestige as just about tops in the loop.

Loyola will throw its great Negro sensation, Walt McGowan, former All-Coast League backfield flash from Long Beach Poly, against the Tartars. McGowan is already being hailed as the probable ball-carrying star on the Loyola varsity next fall. He can do almost anything in offensive way and do it well.

Coach Clark has two worries in drilling his Tartars for the Loyola game. First, he must build a defense to halt McGowan and the Lions' wanted lateral and pass play. Second, he must upcover offensive power on his own line to enable Homer Kennedy and Dick Rodriguez, Compton's star ball-toters, to make gains through the Loyola line.

Steel Worker Is Killed In Collision

Charles Edberg, for four years foreman of the core room in the foundry department of the Columbia Steel plant at Pittsburg, California, was killed recently when his automobile ran into the side of a Sacramento Northern train at 40th and Market streets, Oakland. Edberg was en route to work at the American Manganese Steel Company. He is survived by his widow.

Football will be ably assisted by 21 high school bands under the leadership of Louis W. Curtis, plus a color guard from the R. O. T. C. under the supervision of Colonel Barry.

Proceeds are to be donated to the P. T. A. milk fund. The tickets will be sold in two divisions, general admission being 25 cents and student tickets 10 cents. All students from the northern area are to use tunnels and stairways 21 to 24 inclusive, and the southern group, tunnels and stairways 5 to 8.

HUDKINS goes in for RACING

NEW ORLEANS, (U.P.)—Ace Hudkins, erstwhile welterweight champ, who has hung up his gloves in favor of racing horses, will enter 14 thoroughbreds here for the winter turf season.

Hudkins follows Johnny Dundee, Jack Dempsey and Joe Benjamin in horse racing. But it's doubtful if the others have entered the game on such an extensive scale. Several of Hudkins' horses, which will be sent here from Texas before the season opens Thanksgiving Day, are handicap performers.

The Hudkins stables entries last winter campaigned at Santa Anita, Bay Meadows and other California tracks. With exception of Flag Bearer, the other horses will be running for the first time at New Orleans Fair Grounds track.
