PARIS. (U.P.)—The new Lanvin collection lays stress on early spring outfits in light colored wools and on formal afternoon and evening clothes for the mid-winter season.

The light and dark turquoise shades are used by Madame Lanvin for daytime wear, the collection starting out with a woolen ensemble in a deep blue green with a matching hat. The dress and loose coat are trimmed in a cording of the same material, as is the small hat. For sports there is a lighter turquoise woolen dress with a round shirred neck which is trimmed with triangular applied pockets and is worn with a brown leather belt. The small turquoise hat is likewise trimmed with brown.

Outstanding in the formal clothes is a suit of fine black wool. The skirt in ankle-length, slim and straight but for a flare at the hem. It is worn with a hip-length, full cape and a small toque of white feathers which rise to a Mandarin peak at the top of the crown.

The cape is removed to reveal a bodice of white ermine which fits snugly, is sleeveless but has pointed caps of the ermine extending over the shoulders. A similar costume is worn with a sleeveless blouse of gold lame and a peaked gold toque.

Tips to Remember When Buying Turkey

Here are some tips to remember when buying your turkey. This information comes from the state department of agriculture.

Soft, flexible breastbone means that the turkey is young. Broad, well-rounded breast with thighs covered with meat and fat well distributed gives you more edible meat per pound. Short-legged blocky type with well-rounded body rather than the long-legged rangy type is the best for table use.

Fine grained, soft, light-colored meat, somewhat like fillet of fish, bespeaks tender meat.

Milk-fed fowls are white-fleshed. Corn-fed are yellow-fleshed. Velvet-like skin marks fine quality. The skin should not be torn or scuffed from picking nor discolored from rough handling or improper cooling. If the bird has not been well bled, the skin will be reddened and blue clots of blood will show through the neck skin. Such a turkey does not keep well nor has it god flavor. Dry-picked or semi-scalded turkeys are better quality than the hard-scalded kind. Well-finished, well-dressed birds are free of pin feathers.
