PARIS. (U.P.)—Lots and lots of buttons, shining cire satin, flowers painted on crisp georgette, soft flowing drapery and tiny little pancake hats characterize the new mid-season collection of Jean Patou.

The buttons run spasmodically up and down the backs of dresses. Sometimes they are covered in matching material and occasionally they are in crystal, but there are always buttons! Afternoon dresses and cocktail gowns are trimmed with small buttons, sports dresses and suits have buttons of more generous proportions, while evening gowns go in for crystal buttons or tiny buttons trimmed with the same material which makes up the gown.

Grecian draperies have undergone considerable modification. Dressmakers seem to have realized at last that women will not wear the complicated evening gowns that were shown in the last collections.

The new Patou draperies are simplified for convenience. There is a colorful painted georgette which makes an interesting evening gown. Two streamers are attached to a round velvet collar at the neck and continue over the bare shoulders and back to be caught in loops under the floor-length hem.

Patou shows a new cire satin, shiny and smooth, which is made into tailored cocktail suits which are worn with frothy blouses of georgette or mousseline. The same satin printed in flowers of bright colors makes a formal evening gown.
