COLLEGE GIRL STYLES

About this time, the college student is relinquishing, as always, her attitude of being "certainly glad school is out—I'm sick of it!" and becoming eager for the new term to begin. And the girls are beginning to think about a fall wardrobe that will knock 'em dead from the first day of registration until the end of the first quarter.

One of the great secrets of being perpetually well dressed on a moderate school allowance is the "doubling up" qualities of one's various garments. Sweaters and shirts, of light materials now, are the most versatile of clothes, and may be mixed up and changed about to make a number of separate outfits.

Useful Tweeds
Skirts of mixed tweeds are especially pretty and useful. Bright shirts and sweaters worn in the early fall will be replaced by deeper-shaded uppers later in the season. Worsteds, shirts, and for later, a navy blue or black one, are not amiss in any girl's wardrobe.

Skirt models for fall are for the most part severely tailored, maintaining a trim look in spite of any amount of wriggling around on hard seats during dull lectures. Materials for them are shine-proof.

Culottes, cut perfectly so as to give little hint of the divide, promise to be popular for school wear this fall also. However, good tailoring is absolutely essential for the culotte. They may be worn with thin or heavy shirts.

Charming Models
Regarding sweaters, there are a hundred charming and individual models. The craze for knitting which is sweeping the country has produced a number of new and improved styles. One very smart, model is quaintly old-fashioned, of a plain knit stitch, with faintly puffed sleeves reaching to the elbow, a tight neck, and row of buttons down the front. The blouse is of natural color yarn, and you can knit it yourself. Another clever and very simple pull-on shirt has a bateau neck and felt "mohogram" over the heart. It's high-waisted.

Knitted frocks are also of major importance for school wear. One new knitting stitch gives the garment a cobweb effect, which is utterly feminine, although so practical for school wear. Frivolous necklines are the auge of youthfulness.

Suede jackets, well tailored, will be equally as popular as heretofore. And worsted, or felt, or wide waled corduroy will be used in trim school models.
