All four touchdowns were made by Schmidt, shifty halfback for the Tartars, ably assisted by Jimmy Amman's stellar passing.

The Tartars outplayed Banning in every department, except on punts. The loss of Bobby Trezise as taken the edge off the Tartar's kicking and while Coach Donahue has tried out three or four at this game no one has yet shown any great ability. Donahue plans to make a locker out of Al Winkler now sitting in the line, and may wish the big fellow to the backfield, provided he can make good in this section.

Rossett who had been expected to do most of the punting or Torrance against Banning was afflicted with a "charley-horse" and had to leave the ramp after a few plays.

Rossett at guard and Richard at center showed marked ability in the Banning game,

and the team as a whole put on repeated drives at the Banning defense which turned out to be weak and ineffective, especially against the aerial attack.

Tomorrow the Tartar squad travels to Hawthorne for the first game of the season against Leuzinger high and expect to come back with a win.

## Kaibab Forest Open to Hunters

In order to remove the annual increase of deer in the Kaibab national forest, the Arizona game and fish commission and the U. S. forest service will open a restricted area to hunting from Oct. 16 to Nov. 15 inclusive, states the outing department of the National Automobile Club. This area is on the west side of Kaibab plateau and in it are located Moquitch camp, Pine Flat camp and Big Saddle camp. The east side area will remain closed this year.

Hunters are required to go directly to the camp selected and report to the deputy game warden or ranger, who will arrange for their license and government agreements. A non-resident license costs \$25.00 and each hunter will be allowed one deer, either buck or doe.
