Democratic Registration Passes 600,000 Mark In Los Angeles Co.

Democratic registration in Los Angeles county passed the 600,000 mark with 13,882 to spare during the past week, reaching 613,882, according to analysis of figures obtained today from the registrar of voters. The Democratic gain last week was 21,319, as compared to 5179 for the previous week, the registrar's records revealed.

Analysis of the figures also reveals that for the first time in months the Republican ranks gained instead of lost, but by no means in the proportion that the Democrats did. The G. O. P. gain was 3119, and the total strength of the party in the county now stands at 556,873, as compared to 613,882 for the Democrats, a difference of 63,404 in favor of the Bourbons.

The county total more than passed the 1,250,000-mark forecast for last week, reaching 1,266,233, according to the registrar.

Republicans still have an edge outside Los Angeles city. Here is how the strength of the eight parties is divided:

Democrats—L. A. city, 364,460; rest of county, 249,423; total, 613,882.

Republicans—L. A. city, 300,956; rest of county, 255,917; total, 556,873.

Socialist—L. A. city, 3,415; rest of county, 2,579.

Prohibition—L. A. city, 2,376; rest of county, 3,899.

Commonwealth—L. A. city, 859; rest of county, 235.

Progressives—L. A. city, 753; rest of county, 228.

Liberty—L. A. city, 425; rest of county, 410.

Communists—L. A. city, 333.

Decline to state—L. A. city, 49,559; rest of county, 30,134.

Total—L. A. city, 723,069; rest of county, 543,167.

Total registered—L. A. city and county, 1,266,233.

One-Half of Deaths In Los Angeles Co. From Natural Cause

Only one-half of the 422 persons who died in Los Angeles county last month died of natural causes, according to the May report of Coroner Frank A. Nance. Only 212 of the 422 died a natural death.

Motor vehicles were responsible for the deaths of 74 persons, falls brought death to 36 more and 11 took their own lives.

Homicides ranked next with 14 lives and alcoholism almost tied the homicides with 10. Of the 422 deaths in the county in May, 276 were males and 146 were females.

Airplanes took three lives, electric railways 3, steam railways 2 lives, industrial accidents 6 lives, and infections 7.
