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Twentieth Year Of Teaching For Madame Billini

In another column in this issue Madame Teala Billini, concert pianist and teacher, announces the beginning of her 1934-35 season of work, marking the 20th year of teaching for this artist. From the beginning Madame Billini has had the finest training obtainable. She has had 23 years of study in all branches of music, including five years of teacher training, theory and harmony with Ernest Bloch.

She has consistently kept up with the best of new and practical ideas in teaching. As a result she brings to her pupils the finest of training plus her many years of concert work. She was on the faculty of a well-known eastern school of music for five years. She made her New York debut in 1920.

Since coming to California Madame Billini has conducted master classes and during the seasons of 1928-29 had artist classes at Saint Mary's Academy. Her work has been endorsed by leading educators and musicians throughout the Southland. She is fully capable of carrying pupils from the beginning to the concert stage and has several pupils who are doing professional work.

Whenever and wherever the pupils of Madame Billini appear their work is acclaimed by the most critical as being marked by artistic interpretative finish and clean-cut technique.

Madame Billini has many pupils in Torrance and also has maintained a studio in Los Angeles for the past four and a half years.

PARIS (U.P.)—Georgette Renal makes most of her coats full-length and contrasts them with the dress worn beneath.

A bright Malachite green flannel dress with a draped neckline and kimono sleeves, for instance, is contrasted with the new coats from Chateau-Mouly-Roussel that look like a thick wool alpaca. The coat has sleeves which widen at the elbow and neckline is finished off with a large bow. The belt of supple suede is the same color as the coat and is worn on the dress when the coat is removed. The coat is in Madame Renal's new "Black Iris."

For evening, one of the most striking ensembles from this house is a dress of large check lame in black and white squares. The facings of the short jacket are of shiny patent leather, as well as the belt of the dress. The skirt is slit to the knee in front and has a triple row of small ruffles over one hip. A small ruffle is also used as a border at the hem.

Trains, when they appear, are only used for very informal evening gowns, and are long enough to be carried over the arm or looped over the wrist. One clever train divides in half, is brought up over the shoulders and knotted loosely in front with the effect of a graceful cape.

MOTHERS' CENTER MEETING


