PARIS (U.P.)—The fashion center of the world is threatened with having its name changed from "Paris" to "New York."

The exodus begins with Lyolene, the Russian born French couturier, who has acquired both fame and fortune in the celebrated and historic Place Vendome just opposite the Ritz.

Madame Lyolene has closed up her shop here, lock, stock and barrel, and is moving to New York to open up her business there. She plans to remain indefinitely in the United States designing and executing all-French clothes for American women.

No longer need American fashion and social lights comb here to buy their seasonal wardrobes, for the wardrobe makers are coming to them.

Several other French dressmakers here have expressed their intention of following in Madame Lyolene's wake. If the epidemic proves as contagious as it seems at the moment, it will be a tug-of-war between Paris and New York, with the odds on the American metropolis.
