CHESS

Regular weekly meetings of the Torrance Chess Club continue to be held every Monday and Friday evening from 7:00 to 11:00 o'clock at the Torrance Chamber of Commerce rooms.

The analysis of the writer's game played by mail with the British women's champion, Mrs. B. G. Hollis, continues. Paul, white; Mrs. Hollis, black.

15. R-K5 B-Q2 The object of white's move is the preparation for a well planned attack by boring deep into enemy territory. Black's development has been so greatly retarded that there is no fear of a surprise counter attack.

16. Q-QN4 P-B4 This is an unsuccessful attempt on the part of black to free the game by giving back the P.

17. RXPB B-B3 A very weak attempt to inaugurate a counter attack on the white K position. It is, however, too late. Black has lost much time and space.

18. B-N5 QR-B Now white's attack on the black K begins.

19. R-Q N-Q4 White covers the only remaining space to which the K can move after the check. Black blocks this with the N, a clever move, but delayed too long for effectiveness, as the following move will show.

20. R(15)XN PR White's sacrifice is sound since it deprives him of nothing in the mating combination, and it further reduces the last vestige of resistance in black's position.

21. RXP BxB Black has no other course available.

22. QxBch H-B3 23. R-Q Q-K3 Apparently black has successfully blocked the impending mate and has steered the game into a drawn-out ending. But white still thinks differently.

24. B-N4 QB White guards the P at B3 and black guards the P at N2.

25. Q-K5ch Q-K3 26. Q-Q4 Resigns White, of course, threatens mate by Q-Q3 and black, in order to defend it with B-N3. In this event, white has QxKNP which completely shatters the whole black position. White would not have benefited by 26. Q-N5ch, because of 26... R-B. An exciting game, and very cleanly played.

An extraordinary feat, worthy of note, is the performance of a blind player who finished fourth in a recent British master tournament. He competed against such eminent talent as Sir George Wood, the present British men's champion.

G. F. asks for a full explanation of the move, "pawn capture en passant."

There is considerable misunderstanding among amateur players regarding the legality of this move, as well as over its execution. When the alternative of moving a pawn one or two squares on the first move was introduced into the game about 300 years ago, there automatically arose the evasion of its capture by an opponent's pawn on either adjacent file because the first player's pawn would thus pass the second player's pawn by moving to the fourth square. This evasion of capture would cause an inequality of strategic force in one player over the other. Hence, capture "en passant" (in passing) was invented and has endured as a legal move ever since. It is played as follows:

Western Meat Markets Launch Annual Drive On Quality Beef

That the cattle growers may be benefitted by having their surpluses reduced at a fair price and that the consumer may be able to secure high quality beef, Safeway and Piggly Wiggly markets are sponsoring the third annual organization-wide beef campaign, according to Clarence Dale, district market manager for the Los Angeles area.

With prospects of exceeding last year's effort, in which more than ten carloads of Western grown beef were moved from producer to consumer, the company has placed orders throughout the 11 western states for the finest cattle available.

This year's campaign revolves around three points, Mr. Dale stated. First, there is a cattle surplus despite the enormous slaughtering under the government projects; second, the consumer is not aware that high quality beef is obtainable; third, Safeway and Piggly Wiggly wish to do their part in stabilizing the market for top quality beef by bringing the grower and consumer closer together.

Government statistics, Mr. Dale continued, show that after allowing for the increase in the year already slaughtered, there are more than 65 million cattle in the United States, or more than eight million above the total for 1928 when the supply was ample to meet month time demands.

ROAST BEEF GOES NUDIST

This rather surprising fact is brought out in a recent bulletin on beef cookery prepared by the Home-makers Bureau of Safeway Stores. Modern scientific methods have disproved many of the old rules of roasting, according to Mrs. Julia Lee Wright, director of the bureau.

For one thing, the roast is not to be "dressed" or covered. The use of a lid on the meat, says Mrs. Wright, causes "steaming" instead of roasting, and the result is much less tender. Another fact is that basting has also gone out of style, along with the use of both flour and water.

Salt no longer has to be added before roasting, and, if desired, can be left off entirely until the meat is ready to be served. The value of searing, except for the purpose of forming a crust, has also been minimized. It has been found that searing makes no difference in the tenderness or juiciness of the roast.

Apparently the only "dressing" which the beef roast of 1934 will wear is a liberal coating of fat, applied by market men in a process known as "lardng."

Not all of the discoveries in beef cookery, however, concern the matter of dressing. Of even greater importance is the new knowledge that low temperatures (300° F.) are far more successful than the hot oven advocated by older cook books.
