


Maytag Ships Trainload of Washers to Pacific Coast



NEWTON, Iowa—Officials of The Maytag Company today announced the shipment of a trainload of washing machines to dealers in the Pacific coast states. The train consisted of 45 carloads containing more than 4,000 Maytag washers, valued at nearly one-half of a million dollars. This is the largest single shipment from the Maytag factory since 1928.

Included in the train were approximately 1,000 washers for California dealers. The train will proceed as a unit to Salt Lake

City from which point distribution of the cars will be made to dealers. Maytag washers are sold in Torrance by the Miller Furniture Co., 1220 El Prado.



Evening High School

The Torrance evening school has prepared an interesting survey of the student's birthplaces. The results of this study show the cosmopolitan character of the community. Among the foreign countries, England is the chief contributor, with a total of six students of English birth. The remainder of the British Isles is represented by two from Scotland and one each from Wales and Ireland. Germany has three representatives, while Belgium and Czechoslovakia have each contributed two of whom the birthplaces is further increased by one native each from the countries of France, Russia and Sweden.

Heading the list of those who claim closer regions for their birthplace, are the three students from Mexico and the two from Canada. Also there is one from Nova Scotia, one from the Hawaiian Islands, and one from Alaska.

California tops the list of state contributors with a total of 30 natives, two of whom were born in Torrance. Illinois holds second place with her group of 15. Ohio and Kansas tie for third place with a total of 12 each; and Colorado follows closely with 11 natives. From Iowa there are nine representatives, while Pennsylvania and Minnesota both contribute eight. Missouri sends the school seven and New York six. Texas and Oklahoma contributions fall to only four each. Oregon, Washington and Montana tie with three each.

Only two natives were registered from the following states: Arkansas, Arizona, Michigan, Massachusetts and New Hampshire, and one each from the states of Alabama, Kentucky, North Dakota, Mississippi, Nebraska, Tennessee, New Jersey and Wisconsin.

Meanwhile, the evening school is anticipating the registration of students who are natives of the other 48 states that are not now represented and of the unrepresented foreign countries, to prove that Torrance is a truly cosmopolitan community.

The students and faculty of the evening school are happy that they are again permitted to use the regular classrooms. It has been rather humorous to think of having art in a biology room, and typewriting, stenography and bookkeeping in the gymnasium. But such has been the case. Now they have returned to their regular quarters and find them much better adapted to use.

In the art class Miss Holt is starting work in basketry. She will be pleased to have many more enroll for it or other work along that line.

The band, which has been meeting in the gym on Thursday night will be transferred to the music room. Mr. Brisson will be pleased to welcome any one who is interested. The school has been trying to work up a big group to form a real organization that will be a credit to Torrance. If those who play will come, Mr. Brisson will be able to develop a band that will give Torrance some very good programs, using the new band stand in the City Park.

The horticulture class has lost Mr. Pieters as its teacher, but the principal has secured the services of Mr. Huntington, who promises to be nearly as good. It is hoped that all those interested will continue to attend. If the number should warrant it, an extra evening each week may be added.

The woodshop and machine shop are running full force now, with a very nice enrollment.
