She spoke on "Providing Safety Lanes for Children," pointing out the fact that more lives were lost in accidents in the United States last year than in this country lost during the World War. A great percentage of those accidents cost the lives of children.

It is the responsibility of the parent and the schools to provide some measure of safety for the children, and especially is it the responsibility of the motoring public to look out for the safety of children who are en route to and from the schools.

In addition to the safety factor in regard to the lives and health of children, the school and the parents are faced with the safety factor in morals. If young people are taught to appreciate the right associates, they will naturally choose the right activities in social affairs, sports and recreation. Character building is the purpose of the school, and in this work it can and should be aided by the parents, who should lend every effort to promote the best results along the lines laid down by the teachers.
