Five Schools Unite In Public Schools Week Community Program

Combining the talent of five schools, Community Night, scheduled for Friday, April 12, at 7:30 p. m. in the Narbonne auditorium, will furnish a variety of entertainment. All members of the community are invited to attend.

Miss Moore, music instructor at the high school, has arranged the program. Roy Winters, past master of the Lomita Masonic lodge, is in charge of the publicity and outside arrangements. Participating in the entertainment will be students from Harbor City, Orange street and Walteria elementary schools and Narbonne high school. A combined orchestra from Lomita and Orange street schools, directed by Miss Grace Dering, will offer a selection. This will be followed by an accordion solo by Billy Morris, of Narbonne, and a play, "The Children of Paradise," enacted by children from the Lomita school.

Billy Buker, of Narbonne, will give an address on "The High School and the American Family." The Harbor City school will contribute a Norwegian folk dance. The last number on the program will be the Narbonne glee club's singing of "All Through the Night" with Lloyd Jones as soloist, and "Almighty Lord" from "Cavalleria Rusticana," with Pollyanna Hollar as soloist.

Community Night is the climax of Public Schools Week. All of the schools have received many visitors during the days from April 7 to 12. In the grammar school there was a large influx of parents.

At Narbonne Mrs. Grant's Spanish classes displayed their notebooks of the first ten weeks' work. Small flags of Spanish-language countries lined the walls of the Spanish bungalow.

Landscapes of the buildings and campus caught the attention of the parents who visited Miss Malin's art classes. Geography and history classes displayed maps and notebooks and Miss Ruth Williams showed geometric designs and pictures that students have made from time to time in her math classes. Many parents seemed interested in the girls' woodshop and boys' cooking classes.

RECREATION Department Notes

One of the most interesting endeavors of the Torrance Recreation Department is the one supervised by Mrs. Ann Wilson at the hall park playground. She has taken the total attendance, about 50 children, mostly little girls between the ages of 7 and 13, and formed them into clubs or groups: (1), a quilting club; each child brings quilt pieces and they make baby quilts, large quilts, etc. (2), a doll club; each girl brings material and makes clothes for her doll; then they play house with the dolls. (3), a reading and story club; each child either reads or tells a story at each meeting. (4), a "Think of Others Club," in which the little folks are instructed in courtesy, obedience, respect for those in authority, kindness to animals and proper care, and regard toward flowers, shrubbery and other property. Each club elects its officers, plans its programs and activities and its members are given merit or demerit marks for conduct, interest taken, etc.

The Torrance Chess Club is now putting on a "Round Robin" tournament to determine who of its members can qualify for places on the No. 1 team. All chess players are invited to join the club and try for this team. Those qualifying are promised plenty of action from outside teams.

Mrs. Vera Sheen says: "Don't forget the Wednesday evening card party. It's getting bigger and better each week. Last week prizes were won by Mrs. Cole and Mrs. Chambers."

Mr. Masters, chairman of the entertainment committee, gives us the following schedule of events: April 16, a dance in honor of all our Walteria friends; April 21, Easter egg hunt at Torrance ball park—each child is requested to bring two eggs; April 23, big public dance, music by L.A.C.R.A. dance orchestra—everyone invited; April 30, swimming party, Redondo Plunge—20 cents admission get tickets from any playground supervisor.

A very nice entertainment was given last Tuesday evening at Recreation Center. Music by Mr. Peters and his advanced orchestra, seven acts of amateur vaudeville, Mr. Clyde McNew, master of ceremonies. Dancing for the young folks followed the show and "a good time was had by all."

PERSONAL TAX collections ahead OF LAST YEAR

Collections of unsecured personal property taxes, due and payable when that type of property is assessed, are nearly 40 percent ahead of last year, County Assessor Ed Hopkins reported today.

Better business conditions and the motor validation act are responsible, in the opinion of John W. Hartman, chief deputy assessor. Collections to the end of March were \$121,456, which represented a short month, since the assessor started his work officially on March 4, the first Monday, as provided for by law.

On the corresponding date of last year collections were but \$77,506, a difference of nearly \$44,000.

There also have been some 10 percent more statements of property ownership filed with the assessor's office to date, Hartman reported. As of March 30, a total of 347,433 statements had been filed, as against 310,842 on the corresponding date of last year, an increase of 36,591 for this year.
