

Final Deed For Western Avenue Progress Given

County Officials Consider Asking SERA Labor For Grading Work

The final deed that clears up the right of way for Western avenue between its present terminus near Torrance and San Pedro was being turned over to the county road department this week, it was learned in a check-up.

Within the next week or 10 days, the deeds are expected to be turned over to the supervisors for recording, thus terminating a task that has required several years' intensive work by the county right of way department to acquire the right of way.

County officials are to consider shortly the advisability of filing an application with the SERA for labor to grade the roadway through

In turn the PWA bid which seems best and in turn the PWA then recommends that the council either accept or reject this bid, depending upon the findings of their engineers. In case of a favorable recommendation the council will then award the contract.

Ford Exhibit At San Diego An Exposition Within Exposition

Housed in a large circular building surrounding an open patio, the Ford exhibits at the California Pacific International Exposition which will open in San Diego, California, May 29, are being prepared and will be known as the Ford Exposition.

Within the building, entrance to which will be made through a rotunda built at one side of the great circular structure, and which will house a battery of sensational illuminated murals, a photographic mural and a diorama of Pacific nations, the Ford theme of "Earth to Motor Car" will be followed, demonstrating the control, study, or supervision of processes by the company, from raw products to finished parts.

Progress of Auto In the illuminated murals will be shown the progress from earth to automobile of iron, aluminum, zinc and lead, copper sillimanite, cotton, wool, soy beans, asbestos and cork. Ten large transparent

plates, in a series, will picture the progress of metals from mine to foundry and machine shop and of products from the farm to finished part. To conclude each series a wire-phantom view of the Ford V-8 will show the portion of the car made from the material being followed.

A revolving hemisphere in the center of the rotunda will depict three-dimensional scenes of various Pacific countries, with the Ford car in typical use. Sculpture in natural colors will reproduce the people, utensils and terrain of the various countries.

Spectacular Murals A spectacular feature of the Ford exposition is a series of huge photographic murals which will greet visitors as they leave the rotunda to enter the circular hall of industry. Processes in smelting iron ore will be shown as will the making of a casting. How the V-8 engine block is cast in a single piece with 48 cores— itself a triumph in foundry technique—will be brought out and a 60-foot moving model—in minute and complete detail—will carry iron ore from the incoming boat to the blast furnaces. The fusing and melting of the metal and its release into huge ladles to be transferred by ladle cranes to the foundry, will be graphically portrayed.

How the 52 Ford steels—each for a specific requirement—are made from the iron will, of course, be part of this feature and included in this part of the great educational exhibit a white-hot steel bar will be rolled into a slender strip, upset in a hot heading machine and shaped into a finished drag link. A cold heading machine will form 100 5-14-inch hexagon cap screws a minute from cold steel wire.

Process Interpreted Trained lecturers stationed at every exhibit will interpret for visitors the processes under observation, together with complete information of Ford accuracy, quality, design and other themes considered of interest.

In last week's issue of the Torrance Herald, I note several statements relative to the recall that it is in the interests of truth and fairness should be corrected. It is stated that my petition for the office of City Attorney was denied by the council. The fact of the matter is that I have never at any time sought the office held by Mr. Charles T. Rippey. A petition was filed in my behalf by some 450 residents of Torrance, urging my appointment to the then vacant office of City Judge, but this petition was filed prior to April 1934, and was never submitted to the present city council. You will further recall that I had offered to serve in this office without pay.

The issues in the recall movement are neither political nor personal, and the statement that it is a feeble attempt to build up a spring campaign for the re-election of W. T. Klusman to the city council is unfounded and untrue. I believe that the interests of the voters, taxpayers, and water consumers will best be served by the councilmen facing the issues rather than attempting to cloud them by shouting "Klusman."

Tax Bills Will Show Proportion Of Welfare Cost

Tax Bills Will Disclose Amount Segregated for Charity Expense

Tax bills of Los Angeles county for 1934-35 will show to each taxpayer what proportion of his taxes is being expended for welfare and charity and what proportion for other purposes.

The county board of supervisors today adopted a resolution offered by Supervisor Gordon L. McDonough instructing the county tax collector to have such a breakdown of the general levy stamped on the face of the tax bills.

This will be in addition to the other breakdowns of the total levy which have appeared hitherto on all tax bills.

Of the \$38,000,000 general county levy for 1934-35, only \$14,000,000, McDonough stated, was for the ordinary administration of government; the other \$24,000,000 was used for various welfare and relief purposes.
