Jury Sustains Autopsy Finding In Local Death

Inquest In Carrigan Case Held In Los Angeles Monday

Chief of Police G. M. Calder, Captain John Stroth and other Torrance officials and citizens were called to Los Angeles Monday to attend an inquest held to determine the cause of death of John P. Carrigan, who was found dead in the Torrance jail on May 30.

The autopsy, according to the physician's report, disclosed a gash in the scalp, but no injury to the skull or brain.

When the body was shipped to Ohio, former home of the deceased, a second autopsy was performed, which report declared that Carrigan's skull had been fractured in two places and that the brain showed signs of a hemorrhage.

Testimony of witnesses varied as to the condition of Carrigan's body, when it was removed from the jail to Stone & Myers mortuary, where it was prepared for interment.
