Redemption of Property Made Easy By Assembly Bill Just Approved

Redemption of property on which there is a tax delinquency dating from 1933 or prior thereto has been made much easier through the approval this week by Governor Merriam of Assembly Bill No. 1034.

Terms of this act make it possible for property owners to make complete redemption of such property by the payment of taxes alone, without any penalties, costs or interests. The provisions of this new measure expire on September 1, 1935. After September 1, and until April 20, 1936, the only charge on redemption will be 7 percent interest per annum from July 1, 1934.

This act does not apply to 1934 delinquencies, excepting where there is a prior delinquency on the same property.

In the event redemption is now being made on the ten payment plan, the owner is entitled to redeem on the basis provided by the new act and have a deduction for the total amount of all payments previously made.

A property owner also has the privilege of adopting the ten payment plan of redemption without penalties, but with interest at 7 percent per annum from July 1, 1934. This privilege expires on April 20, 1936.

Where property became delinquent in 1934 and there were no prior delinquencies, the partial payment plan is also applicable.

Since the new act is the most liberal measure yet passed for the relief of property owners, tax officials are hoping for a large increase in delinquent tax collections.

Total unpaid tax delinquencies for the last five years amount to about \$38,000,000 in Los Angeles county. The delinquency for 1935 is expected to amount to about 11 percent of the levy, or around \$9,000,000.

Maintenance For Lomita Sewers Provided For By Supervisors

Maintenance for sewers recently installed without cost to property owners of Lomita was provided for this week by action of the board of supervisors in annexing the area to the existing Lomita sewer maintenance district.

The area, now served by sanitary sewers installed by the Civil Works Administration and finished by the State Emergency Relief Administration, is bounded on the west by the Torrance city limits and an extension of the city limit southerly, on the north by 230th street and Lomita boulevard, on the east by the western boundary of the city of Los Angeles, and on the south by an irregular line extending between 261st and 263rd street.

County Surveyor Alfred Jones, appearing before the board of supervisors to answer questions, stated that approximately 22 miles of new line and house connection sewers had been laid by the federal-employed men during the last 18 months. This co-operation on the part of the federal government, Supervisor John R. Quinn also took occasion to point out, represented an outright gift of more than \$600,000 to property owners and residents of the Lomita district. As a result, formation of several expensive districts planned for construction of the sewers will not be necessitated. Pending now for the Lomita district are applications for a much-needed storm drain to drain the area south of the boulevard, and carry off waters that flow down upon the area from the north slopes of the Palos Verdes hills.
