Neva Declared A Free Agent

Neva was given his release by Manager Spud Murphy last April and was supposed to go to the Hollywood club of the Federal League, but signed with the Oilers instead. Chico Sabella, star pitcher for the Oilers, has been turned loose and may sign with the Long Beach Admirals.

He's Still Champ

Zamperini Closes High School Career With Brilliant Victory; Undefeated

The smiling champ is still champ. Louie Zamperini, world's champion miler, retained his crown when he defeated Phil Graves, of Hollywood, handily with some 20 yards to spare, in the feature race of the high school meet held in conjunction with the Ohio State U. S. C. affair starring Jesse Owens last Saturday afternoon at the Coliseum. Louie's crown didn't even wobble in this event, which had been ballyhooed by the metropolitan papers as one of the high-

lights of the afternoon, with the possibility that Graves might knock Louie out from under his laurels.

The champ ran his usual smart race and had plenty in reserve at the finish which found Graves run off his legs, a sadly disheartened and disillusioned kid. Graves as usual took the lead. Louie dropped back to about seventh place for the start, but moved up in the second lap to fall in behind the Hollywood kid. There they stayed until the final round when Zamperini took the lead on the north straightaway only to have Graves make a determined effort which put him alongside of the champ on the turn. His best was not good enough. Louie passed him of the turn and they came into the straightaway neck and neck. Fifty yards from the finish the champ unwrapped a sprint which left Graves standing up. The Hollywood lad slowed almost to a walk when he saw the flying Zamperini heels in front and finished second, four seconds behind Louie, who ran the event in 4:23.3. Madrid of Belmont, who had hung on with the leaders, was third.

Graves had been touted as "the boy who doesn't know how fast he can run." He roused out Saturday.

Dates of the Far Western meet at San Diego, which have been erroneously announced as this week-end, will be next Wednesday and Thursday, June 26 and 27. Louie will enter the 1500-meter run in the junior division, which will be run off on Wednesday. Just what competition he will have has not been learned but it is safe to say that he will meet some formidable college stars who will keep him stepping.

On the following Sunday Louie, accompanied by his big brother Pete, will leave for Lincoln, Nebraska, to take part in the National A. A. U. junior championship meet which will be held July 5 and 6. His entry blank reads: Louie Zamperini, representing the Torrance Kiwanis Club, unattached.

These two meets coming up will give a fairly reliable picture of what the Torrance lad can do in ultra-fast company, and determine his prospects for making the United States Olympic team in 1936. Followers of the boy's career, which has been an unbroken series of victories for the past three years, are confident that he will be able to match strides with the best of them.

Since he is competing in the junior division he will not meet such stars as Cunningham, Venke, or Bonthron, but should he win in his event at Lincoln he will be in line to enter against them later on.

Pete Zamperini, who gave U. S. C. their first point in the mile run last Saturday, will also be entered in the meet at San Diego, probably in the senior division, and in the junior division at Lincoln.

McQueen Places In All-City Meet

John McQueen, Narbonne half miler, placed third in his event at the All-City meet held Saturday at the Coliseum. John, Hubert Luck of Torrance, who placed fourth in the 440, Gregory of North Long Beach, and Henderson of Gardena, were the only Marine League athletes to place in the variety finals.

The Torrance team was second in the mile relay which was won by a negro team from Jacob Rhs, with Gardena third. Hubert Luck put on a great sprint at the finish of the anchor lap to beat out Henderson for second place. None of the Torrance or Narbonne entries in the junior divisions placed.

SPORT SHOTS

Pete Zamperini leaves tonight for Berkeley to compete in the N. C. A. A. representing U. S. C. Pete has a good chance to place among the winners, as he is in great shape.

Last Saturday after the All-City meet held in Los Angeles, or should I say the All-Colored meet, Torrance high school track athletes broke training (except Zamperini) many for their last time at Torrance high school. Old-lady hard luck persists in keeping her hand on Hubert Luck's shoulder. After taking a fourth last week in the quarter-mile run, with his bad foot driving him crazy every step, the judges of the curve disqualified Hubert. They said that he pushed another runner off the track. Yesterday was watching Hubert, at the time, through a strong pair of glasses; what actually happened was, when Luck cut for the pole, another boy cut at the same time, but Hubert would not slow up and this boy tried to cut in without the necessary two strides required. The other athlete should have been disqualified instead of our Torrance boy.

The track meet was truly a Jesse Owens and Zamperini legend. Jesse took four first places without extending himself. Pete Zamperini took first in the mile, a big upset, according to newspapers, after outsmarting the great Ohio State runner in the first lap. Pete took the lead and made his competitor run so slow in the initial lap that he won the race, 58 seconds flat, winning by 15 yards. Louie Zamperini certainly made the great Phil Graves of Hollywood look terrible. Graves took the lead at the beginning and held it as long as he could. About 150 yards from the finish the champion of champions passed Graves up so fast that the breeze nearly blew him off the track. Louie certainly proved to the world that he is the greatest high school miler ever born, and will give the big boys, Cunningham, Bonthron, Venke and Lovelock a run for their money next year in the Olympic games. I predicted that Louie would break the record again, but his brother's last words were to just run to win.

Last week I was talking to a man that should know his stuff in night ball. He has been connected with teams ever since they started the game in Southern California. Here are a few Sport Shots of what he told yours truly. Lionel Brown, now playing with Covina, American league is by far the greatest pitcher in night ball. Billy Weidner, local boy, employed by the National Supply Co., is playing for Covina. He is the greatest pitcher in order of greatness as follows: Brown, Morrell and Louie Neva. He says Neva tops the list of night ball in being the Babe Ruth of the game.

Brown, in three games struck out 64 batters in his league. Not bad. This great battery, Brown and Weidner has been offered to play five games a week. Los Angeles, Santa Monica and Hawthorne. But are seriously thinking of accepting an offer that has been made to them recently, that of entering in the Examiner tournament, sponsored by a movie star in Hollywood. The battery of this team would be, if the offer is accepted, Brown and Morrell pitchers and Billy Weidner catcher. According to information they have already received their A. A. U. cards. All of these boys used to play for our local Bluebirds, and should be in the line-up at the present time.

Here is an article that is a little late, but may be of interest to readers. Bob Erick of San Ramon high school, winner of the state meet, held recently in Fresno is only a junior, and has another year of school. Erick won his event in 1934. Not bad for a junior in high school.

The University of Iowa will try to break the world's records in the 40 and 80-yard relay races at the National A. A. U. meet held at Lincoln, Nebraska, July 4 and 5. The crack half mile Iowa team which ran 1:52.4 at the Kansas Relays will try for a record in the 800-meter event, now held by Southern California. U. S. C. set the mark of 1:25.8 in 1927. The American Olympic team of 1932 holds the 400-meter relay mark of 40 seconds.

The Hawks team expects to keep in training a month after the close of University classes for the Lincoln A. A. U. meet.

- 6 CYL. \$6.15 Parts Additional 4 CYL. \$4.40
- 1. Grind valves.
- 2. Clean carbon.
- 3. Remove all spark plugs, clean and adjust burnt points.
- 4. Adjust breaker points to compensate for wear.
- 5. Check and adjust ignition timing to prevent heating.
- 6. Correct undue tappet and valve noises and thoroughly lubricate.
- 7. Remove carburetor, clean thoroughly, inspect jets, set float level to insure good mileage.
- 8. Remove fuel pump bowl and screen.
- 9. Tighten all water connections from motor to radiator.
- 10. Tighten cylinder head and all manifold bolts to eliminate compression leaks.
- 11. Adjust water pump packing nut and lubricate with special grease.
- 12. Adjust and clean generator third brush to insure proper charging rate to battery.
- 13. Adjust fan-blade pitch and fan belt to proper tension, insuring correct air and water circulation.
- 14. Drain and flush radiator to remove rust sediment.
- 15. Clean battery terminals, test and fill battery.
- 16. Test car and render thorough inspection report.
