Paris Styles

PARIS (U.P.)—Parisienne have been very busy dressing up their hair to correspond with the increased formality of summer clothes. Of course, women can't expect to swim, play tennis, golf or ride horseback and still keep every single lock in place, but all hairdressers are stressing the importance of wearing an evening coiffure ornate enough to be in keeping with an elaborate gown.

The famous Antoine, whose word is law on two continents, has decreed that women must give up the standardization of the American style of hairdressing and find individual styles which will suit them. He studies a woman's face carefully, analyzes her good points and her defects, then brings out the former and masks the latter.

Antoine still favors a lacquered hair dress for evening, and if a woman's face is suitable, frequently creates a lacquered coiffure patterned after ancient Greek and Roman styles. Few women have classic enough features to support this, however, and for the rest he arranges clusters of curls. If the face is long and slender, the curls are clustered at the nape of the neck, at either side of the head or both. The shorter, wider face can stand lengthening with a row of curls on the top of the head.

Several important dressmakers have decreed that flowers be worn in the hair for evening, and violets, roses, lilies, gardenias and the like are woven in the curls. The same flower is naturally repeated as trimming on the gown.
