Holquin Matched to Face Marke In Wind-up Bout At Westside Friday

This was not possible, however, as the U. S. S. Indianapolis to which Ladley belongs, leaves Long Beach early this week for northern Pacific ports along with five other ships. These boys, Ladley and Marke, put on their gloves one of the most, if not the most-heckle-battle ever staged at the Westside Auditorium. In the second round both boys fell out of the ring, Marke being knocked unconscious by reason of the fall. Ladley was unhurt and crawled back into the ring. After some delay of a minute or so Marke was able to continue and waged a relentless battle against Ladley. However, Ladley took the decision in four rounds by an eyelash, mainly because of his superior boxing ability.

Ralph Holquin is the Indian boy who bowled them over in four straight wins at the Westside a month or so ago. Marke vs. Holquin will make a fight that will have the fans hanging onto their seats as both are natural sluggers. A slugfest is promised to the fans when these two boys meet in the ring next Friday.

The semi-windup will be a bout that Westside officials can guarantee will be action from start to finish. This spot will bring together Benny Robello and Red Myers. These two boys staged a hectic battle two weeks ago at the Westside, in which Myers won by a shade.
