PARIS, (U.P.)—Fragile frocks of organza and diaphanous chiffons and laces of the garden party variety are seen in smart Paris restaurants for informal dining during the hot weather months.

Floral and figured designs in pastel shades made with a light cape or jacket are most popular although coats of fine wool also are seen. Two tones of one color are frequently worn, for example a smart Parisian dining on the Champs Elysees wore a chiffon dress in a pale shade of cornflower blue with a cape of a deeper tone. Her hat, of ostrich feathers, was in several shades of cornflower blue.

Lace is seen frequently in long-sleeved dresses which have accompanying short jackets. One of the smart combinations is the ever-popular white belted in black velvet ribbon and worn with a wide brimmed straw of a lacy weave, either in white or black.

The large brimmed hats require skilled adjustment and suitable coiffure. They come in tulle, straw or felt in a variety of styles ranging from the coal shovel bonnet which is pushed well over the eyes to the cartwheel type.

Small toques of flowers or feathers are equally popular. Flowers adorn almost every frock. The same flower worn on a dress is repeated in the decoration of the hat.
