PARIS. (U.P.)—The use of ruffles on daytime and evening dresses is becoming more and more prevalent, particularly for resort wear where there is a greater occasion to "dress up." An afternoon frock seen at the Sporting Club of Vichy had a great frill of three wide ruffles around the neck in white, light blue and white. There were four wide ruffles on the skirt alternating the white and the blue tones.

At the same French resort, Mrs. Serge Voroff, wife of the famous Viennese rejuvenation expert, wore an ankle-length crepe print in blue and white dots. The dress was trimmed with a continuous wide ruffle, which surrounded the neck, ran down the front of the dress and encircled the hem.

Conspicuous among the beautiful gowns at the Casino was the Maggy Rouff creation in peach colored organza. Here, too, the outstanding note was a series of ruffles. The evening gown was youthful in its simplicity. The bodice was moulded to the figure and perfectly plain except for double shoulder straps, both in back and in front. All straps were independent of each other, a new note after the twisted straps which have been featured this season. The wide full skirt was composed of four tiers of frilled ruffles which flared to increased fullness at the floor.

Grills Win Favor For Summer

Meals cooked "all at once" are in decided favor with housewives since they effect not only a saving of time but also fuel. So it is not strange that combination grills which are quickly cooked by the favorite method, broiling, meet with approval.

The foods chosen for combination grills may be any of the quickly cooked meats and vegetables. Lamb chops, either rib or loin, and the tender steaks, such as porterhouse, T-bone, and club, are perhaps the most usual choices. However, ham slices, lamb steaks cut from the leg, any kind of ground meat shaped into cakes, bacon slices, and sausage links are also suitable for the grill.

Combinations for this type of meals are suggested below by Inez S. Wilson, home economist.

I. Lamb chops, pineapple slices, link sausages, tomato slices.

II. Ham, pre-cooked buttered cauliflower, pre-cooked sweet potatoes, peach halves.

III. Ground beef cakes, stuffed tomatoes, potato cakes.
