

Shades of Robin Hood and his merry band of green doublet men are walking abroad these days in Torrance—at least on Amapola avenue in the hobby workshop of O. R. Hill. Mr. Hill has an intensely interesting hobby, that of making bows and arrows. Mr. Hill can show the interested inquirer an imposing array of his handiwork. There are long, gleaming bows of yew wood which pull from 40 to 120 pounds, and are as tall as a man when they are strung. Then there are shorter bows of lemon wood, pulling 20 pounds, just right for children. Mr. Hill has made approximately 100 sets of bows and arrows. He has sold many and given some to his friends. He has equipped each member of his boys' Sunday school class with a bow and arrow; so don't be too surprised if some aspiring, back-sliding young archer picks off one of your favorite fryers some day. The boys enthusiastically snipe hunt anything alive and on legs. They've been inspired by tales of Mr. Hill's brother, Howard Hill, who is one of the few men ever to have hunted big game with a bow. He has stalked and killed a 200-pound deer on a big game hunt. His skill with the bow and arrow gave him the lead in the movie, "The Last Wilderness."

O. R. Hill not only makes, but shoots a bow expertly. He uses the snap shot or hunting shot, not the usual point of aim system taught novices. When he gets into action in the archery range in his back yard, he can make a bull's eye from any distance with any pound bow he chooses. His skill would make even Robin Hood sit up and take notice.
