NOTICE OF PUBLIC WORKS

Public Notice is hereby given that the City Council of the City of Torrance did at a regular meeting of said Council, held on the 27th day of August, 1935, pass a Resolution of Intention No. 738 to order the following work to be done and improvements to be made, within said city, to-wit: the closing up, vacating and abandoning that portion of a street described as follows:

The closing up, vacating and abandoning of those portions of Lots 1 to 6, inclusive, and Lot 18, Block B, and those portions of Lots 1 to 12, inclusive, Block C, all in Tract No. 3202 as shown on map recorded in Book 100, pages 13 and 14 of Maps, Records of Los Angeles County within a strip of land 100 feet wide lying 50 feet on each side of the center line of Ellis Avenue as shown on said Map, as referred to in Deed recorded November 6, 1933, in Book 12429, page 234, Official Records of Los Angeles County, California.

That portion of Lot 16, Block D, of Tract No. 7606, as shown on map recorded in Book 90, page 31, of Map, records of Los Angeles County within a strip of land 5 feet wide, the northeastern line of which is parallel with and 5 feet northerly, measured at right angles from the straight line in the southwesterly boundary of said lot, as referred to in Deed recorded November 6, 1933, in Book 2392, page 257, Official Records of Los Angeles County, California.

Applications For Pensions Start Sept. 1

No Fees Required of Aged Persons Seeking Aid Under New Law

Aged residents of Los Angeles county, who may apply for aid under federal and state social security acts, after September 1, can now receive complete co-operation from department of charities workers in determining their eligibility, according to Superintendent of Charities Rex Thomson. "Attempts have been made in the past by a few private firms and individuals to obtain fees from elderly persons in return for assistance in preparing applications and developing proof of eligibility," Thomson said. "At this time when thousands of elderly persons feel that they will be entitled to assistance under the new acts," Thomson continued, "they should understand that it is not necessary for them to pay any fee for advice in preparing their applications."

Thomson pointed out that after September 1, when his department begins to accept applications, those seeking such assistance will be required to produce proof as to age, residence and need. Evidence of age, he declared, includes birth certificates or baptismal certificates, marriage license records, registration information as a voter more than five years ago, or the affidavit of a reputable citizen not related to the applicant. The charities department is required to verify this evidence, Thomson said. He added that if every other method failed the department has access to federal census records as far back as 1850.

Compton Junior College Opens September 16-17

Guidance Examinations For New Students Held On September 7

The new administration building housing offices, library, study hall and cafeteria will be ready for students of this community who plan to enter Compton Junior College at the opening of school, according to announcement from officials of that institution. The auditorium seating 2,000 people, the women's gymnasium and the plunge will be ready shortly after the college opens. The fall semester will begin with registration on September 16 and 17. Fourteenth grade students will be registered on Monday, September 16, and thirteenth grade students will register on Tuesday. Guidance examinations for new students entering the thirteenth grade of the junior college will be held on Saturday, September 7, starting at 9 o'clock. Advance registration indicates that there will be an increase in enrollment this year, and students interested in entering any of the new classes for which there seems to be considerable demand should make inquiry in advance.
