

## Evangeline Booth, Salvation Army Leader To Attend Congress

Southern California will be the mecca for Salvationists from 11 Western States and Hawaii, when General Evangeline Booth, international leader of the Salvation Army, arrives here for the Western Territorial Congress to be held in Los Angeles October 23-27. Twelve hundred officers are expected to be present, including the entire student body of the Western Territorial Training College at San Francisco.

The general public will have five opportunities to hear this woman, who is considered one of the greatest of modern orators, and one of the most brilliant women orators of all time. She will be welcomed at a public meeting on Wednesday evening, October 23, at First Methodist church, Eighth and Hope, Los Angeles, when noted civic leaders will be present.

Her second public meeting will be staged on Saturday night at Trinity Auditorium, 9th and Grand, Los Angeles. This will take the form of a huge young people's demonstration. Sunday morning she will speak before 6,000 people in the civic auditorium at Pasadena. In the afternoon and evening Sunday, October 27, she will be heard at the Church of the Open Door, 6th and Hope, Los Angeles. The afternoon will be devoted to a musical festival, the evening featuring a mammoth evangelistic service.

## Right of Way Purchases to Be Tested in Court

### Supervisors Move to Institute Case Regarding Use of Gasoline Fund

Legality of using gasoline tax funds to purchase rights of way for streets in Lomita and other unincorporated sections of Los Angeles county is to be determined by a test suit ordered today by the board of supervisors, after nearly a half-hour's argument Monday afternoon.

Although he voted for the suit, Supervisor Gordon L. McDonough questioned its advisability stating "this means a raid on the county gasoline tax." Owners of property will beseege the supervisors, McDonough said, to purchase their properties for rights of way. The Los Angeles supervisor said he believed such improvements were of value to the property owners, and a point to be considered.

Supervisor John Anson Ford, of Hollywood, said he expected a negative opinion from the county counsel, but he moved for the instruction for the suit. The question arose over the possibility of using gasoline tax funds to acquire rights of way needed for the widening of Sunset boulevard, near Beverly Hills, and in Ford's West Hollywood district.

A previous motion by Supervisor John R. Quinn to ask the county counsel for an opinion on the legality was lost by a vote of three to two. After further discussion, the board members voted unanimously for Ford's motion to institute the test suit, and thereby have the supreme court decide the issue.

## Long Illness Ended By Death

Mrs. Katie May Jacobs, age 43, passed away at her home, 310 Portola avenue, Friday, October 11, after a long illness. Mrs. Jacobs was born in Texarkana, Arkansas, to which city the remains will be taken for burial. She had resided in Torrance for 15 years. Mrs. Jacobs leaves her mother, Mrs. Lulu J. Matthews, of this city, and her aunt, Mrs. J. R. Walker, of Texarkana, both of whom will accompany the body east.
