SAFeway HELPS market huge crop OF WALNUTS

California's walnut industry, confronted with one of its largest crops in years, will be aided by Safeway Stores, Inc., in stimulating consumption of its products during an intensive pre-Holiday Season, Producer-Consumer benefit campaign, to take place this week. It was announced today.

The campaign will be waged throughout the entire Safeway organization, and it is anticipated that more than a quarter million pounds of walnuts and other varieties of nuts will be moved into consumption.

The California Walnut Growers Association, organized to help improve marketing and production of the industry, is co-operating with Safeway Stores in the conduct of this latest "farm relief" campaign, it was stated.

Mr. Ralph Pringle, divisional manager of Safeway Stores in Southern California, said that the facilities of the company in 21 states, comprising more than 3,000 stores, would be used to help increase the consumption of walnuts.

"The nut crop in California," Mr. Pringle said, "is estimated to be the largest in recent years, and, inasmuch as prices are somewhat lower than they have been, we will endeavor to do the very best sales job possible so that the California walnut industry will not be forced to suffer through an unnecessary surplus of its products."

"Newspaper advertising will be used by each Safeway district in an effort to encourage the housewife to buy more walnuts for immediate consumption and particularly for use during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday periods."
