## Javens and McFadden For All-Southern California Team

If the C. I. F., Los Angeles Board of Education and Southern California Amateur Association overlook the two Torrance high school sensations, Jack Javens and Johnny McFadden when picking their all-Southern California teams this year, there is something radically wrong. Both of these two boys have been outstanding in their respective positions in the Marine League for the past two years. Both boys were picked by the coaches and newspapers for all-league berths last year, and have been picked by the newspapers this year. Both of these boys have received unanimous mention for their positions this year in the 1935 all-league team, having been picked by every coach and sports writer in the district.

## Jack Javens, Right Half

Jack Javens is one of the finest backfield men that this writer has ever had the pleasure of watching. Jack is a perfect blocker if there ever was one, he is a great broken field runner and is outstanding on the receiving end of passes. Jack was on the Tartar track team for two years, making his varsity letter as a weight man, he also is capable of running the 100-yard dash in 10.3. He is outstanding in the league for his excellent conversions of goals, winning several games for his team with his educated toe. Weighs around 180 pounds and is a great fighter on the field of play.

## John McFadden, Left End

Last year when the coaches voted on the all-league teams, Johnny was picked by every coach in the league as the best. This boy is the fastest varsity end in the entire league, running the 100-yard dash last year in 10 seconds flat and the 220-yard dash around 23 seconds. He is also a good low hurdler. On the football field he is a fighter from beginning to end, a great blocker, pass receiver; scoring a few scores for his team this year while on the receiving end of passes. His main objective on defense is to smear all plays before they start, has only been taken out of three plays all year, and is by far the outstanding end of Torrance football history. Was voted last year as the greatest all-around athlete to ever attend a Torrance school, having earned a letter in every major sport. Johnny tips the scales at 170 pounds.

## At Least Honorable Mention

These two greatest football players of Torrance high school should either be placed on the first, second or honorable mention team of the all-Southern California teams. Both have been outstanding in helping Torrance to win its two league championships, the only two in the history of the local institution. Both of these two boys graduate in February, and have had several college scholarships offered to them, on the coast, one in the south and one in the mid-west. Both of these two boys have played 60 minutes of every league game this year, a feat that causes the daily newspapers to call college players, "Iron Men."

The entire town of Torrance is backing these two boys for the mythical recognition.

This boy Basich must have something. Several weeks ago when Jerry Breslin ran out on Sailor Francis Marke in a scheduled main event, Marke refused to meet this man Basich even though it meant the saving of the show. Also at the Olympic Auditorium in Los Angeles a week or so previous, Hank Bath, Jack Kearns' new heavyweight sensation, could not be induced to take on Basich when Terris Hill came to the arena in a drunken condition and not permitted to go on. All this would point to the fact that Basich has something on the ball.

Tommy Huffman, the battle scarred veteran who K.O.'d Pop-eye Davidson in the first round last Friday, is taking on the bad boy of the Long Beach battlers, Jimmy Meadows, in the semi-windup. Meadows is a showman second to none and says there is no one can beat him at his favorite club, the Westside. This fight may steal a lot of color from the main event. With two top spots as these the club will be full to the doors.

## FEDERAL regulations to BE ENFORCED

SACRAMENTO, (U.P.)—Federal regulations governing duck hunting will be strictly enforced during the California season, November 20 to December 19 inclusive, officials of the fish and game division announced.

## Shooting permitted only between 7 a. m. and 4 p. m.; live decoys prohibited; no guns larger than 10-gauge permitted and repeater or automatic guns carrying more than three shells banned; no shooting from power or sail boats, automobiles, or airplanes; shooting confined to 100 feet from the shoreline, as determined by ordinary high tide, except where a continuous line of vegetation exists from shore, 100 feet from that line.

Regulations for commercial clubs provide no more than two hunters will be allowed in one blind; blinds must be at least 80 yards apart, and shooting permitted only on Wednesdays, Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays, and opening and closing days.

## All-Sections On New York '36 Grid Card

Coast to Send Stanford; South, Georgia; Midwest, Notre Dame

NEW YORK, (U.P.)—One of the most attractive inter-sectional football schedules ever arranged for one city will be played in New York next fall.

Fordham, Columbia, New York U. and Army already have booked eight inter-sectional games with leaders from other sections of the country. Manhattan College, which is gradually developing into a football power under Chick Meehan, is dickering for several inter-sectional games, which will probably increase the invading teams to 10 or more.

Three Southern teams, two from the Midwest, two from the Far West and one from the Southwest have been scheduled for New York appearances. Fordham has four inter-sectional battles, meeting Southern Methodist, Georgia, Purdue and St. Mary's. Columbia has two, playing V.M.I. and Stanford. New York University has scheduled the U. of North Carolina and may book another inter-sectional foe. As usual, the Notre Dame Army game will be played at Yankee Stadium.

## Stanford to Return

One of the high spots of the 1936 season will be the return of Stanford to New York to meet Columbia. Stanford made its first trans-continental journey in 1928, when the Indians, then coached by Pop Warner, came to New York and conquered Army, 26-0. It will be the second game in history between Columbia and Stanford. The Morningside Lions defeated the Indians in the Rose Bowl game January 1, 1934, by a score of 7-0.
