Torrance Resident On 1928 Olympic Boxing Team

Many residents of the City of Torrance are acquainted with Carmen (Tony) Tuzzolino; but few in town know that he competed on the great American Olympic team of 1928. Tony as he likes to be called by his many friends, made the trip to Amsterdam, Holland back in the games of eight years ago; on the boxing team, after winning the Pacific Coast welterweight title, and the Golden Gloves championship. His next fights were in the Olympic finals, at Boston, where he won for the Los Angeles Athletic Club, and himself, four out of five fights, earning a berth on one of this country's greatest Olympic teams. After the Amsterdam games, Tony decided to try his luck as a professional, having several fights at the Hollywood and Olympic stadiums. In 1929 he made a successful boxing tour of the Philippines, Australia, New Zealand, Samoa Islands, Fiji Islands and the Hawaiian Islands. While in Australia, Tony had the honor of winning a decision over the champion, Ambrose Palmer, and Jack Carroll. Carmen Tuzzolino was born in Pueblo, Colo., was 19 years old when he made the Olympic team, and got his start fighting while selling newspapers on the Pueblo Chief and the Pueblo Star-Journal. Well, Miss City of Torrance, after next week, will have the honor of claiming three members who have competed on Olympic teams; Louis Zamperini, 1936; Carmen Tuzzolino, 1928, and Joe Bay, who competed for Denmark several years ago.

Fifteen years ago, Vernon Blenkiron was the toast of the nation, as Louis Zamperini is today. But mention Blenkiron to track fans today and they stop and question you about him. In 1921 Vernon Blenkiron was attending Compton high school, and was the holder of the world's interscholastic records, in the 100 and 220 yard dashes. "Blink" was one of the main reasons that the great Charles Paddock broke so many world marks. In fact the duel races between Paddock, a U.S.C. runner and Blenkiron, a high school student will never be forgotten by "old-time" track fans. After graduating from the Compton schools, "Blink" played professional baseball in the big leagues for several years, and was considered one of the fastest base runners of all time. He now holds down the center field position on the Firestone Tire Company team, that played in the Municipal park last Sunday afternoon. Yes I had the honor of competing on the same track team with Blenkiron, at Compton high school.

ERRORS LOSE CHAMPIONSHIP GAME FOR LOMITA MERCHANTS

Record Attendance at Ball Games, Barbecue at City Park Sunday; Hollywood Girls Defeat Weary San Pedro Team in Night Game

Attendance at the city park broke all records last Sunday with a church barbecue picnic, band concert, championship ball game all going on at the same time during the afternoon, and a girls' baseball game at night. The Catholic Church of the Nativity put on the picnic, of which the band concert was an added attraction, and festivities started at 11 o'clock with the serving of the barbecue dinner and continued until late in the afternoon.

A capacity crowd occupied the stands at the ball game, the third of the championship series between the Firestone team and the Lomita Merchants, which went ten innings to a 12-9 score in favor of the visiting team.

Errors Lose Game
