To Promote Sport Program in Torrance Is Under Consideration

More and better sports will be the slogan of the Torrance Athletic Club, a new organization, now in the process of being launched, which its promoters believe will fill a long felt want in the athletic program of this city.

Torrance now has all the makings for a good live town in a sport way, with a fine ball park, an auditorium, prospects for public tennis courts, swimming pool and access to some of the finest golf courses in the country.

Torrance has all the makings but it lacks an organization which will take hold of the problem of promoting athletic events which will put these "makings" to work.

At the present time, about all the sport fodder the fan has to chew on is baseball, soft and hard variety. Like the old-fashioned one-lung motor car, the sport program limps badly and is in danger of giving up the ghost altogether. Not everyone likes baseball so well that he wants a steady diet of it. Some like football, boxing, wrestling, tennis, golf, basketball, track and what not.

The Torrance Athletic Club, if and when successfully promoted, will take over the job of furnish-

ing all these and maybe more sports for Torrance.

The plan involves a small expenditure on the part of the sport fan. In other words, a membership list is required, the members to pay the small sum of \$1.00 a year to belong. The officers shall be elected by the membership and shall serve without pay. The officers and board of directors shall be responsible for putting on good, clean, amateur and semi-pro sports of all varieties in the city, and the expenses shall be met from the proceeds of the sport entertainment.

There are plenty of former stars of the boxing and wrestling game in Torrance to take over the management of this angle of sport. There are plenty of football men here to make up a good semi-pro team.

The Torrance Athletic Club, provided it goes over as the promoters hope it will, should promote weekly shows of this type during the season, as well as basketball games, and other types of indoor and outdoor sports. Something should be done to provide a more varied entertainment in this city for those who live and work here.

The Torrance Athletic Club may be the answer to this problem, and will take the place of a junior chamber of commerce, which project has been agitated recently in the interest of stirring up some activities of a popular nature.

Membership in the club will be open to women, as well as men, for there are a number of competitive sports in which the girls can take part. It is not necessary to be an athlete to become a member.

How about it, now, you sport fans, are you interested or not? If you are, watch this paper for an announcement of the date of a meeting when all the angles will be discussed and you can vote for or against such an organization.

Lomita Merchants Drop Game to Hard Hitting Los Angeles Colored Giants

Sunday's game between the Lomita Merchants and Los Angeles Colored Giants turned out to be a field day for the dusky visitors who drove Hamilton to the showers in the fourth inning with a flock of hits and runs. Lomita got an early lead with one run in the first inning, but it slipped away in short order when the colored boys bore down in the third inning to put over three runs. Hamilton started the fourth but was relieved after one out by Morris who held the Giants scoreless for two frames but weakened in the seventh and was nicked for four hits and three runs, to which the visitors added one more run in each of the next two frames.

The Giants corralled a total of 19 hits, two of them for extra bases, and 12 runs, while the Lomita boys chalked up nine hits and six runs.

Lomita had the best of it on extra base hits with a homer by Weddle, triples by Eppley, Palica and doubles by League, but they were a trifle off form in the field and recorded six errors, which were responsible for a number of runs on the Giant side of the scoreboard.

Manager Walt Morris tried out a new player at third base, Rowe, who is no stranger to soft ball but was playing his first regulation game. Rowe handled two chances at the first sack, made two assists, one of them on a double play, and got two hits out of five times up. He looked very good and will probably play the position regularly.
