County Activities

Glendale city officials do not feel that sufficient time is available to properly consider the county manager proposal for Los Angeles county between now and the November 3 election.

In a communication to the board of supervisors, Glendale city officials urged that no action be taken which might place the county manager or any of the other three proposals of the joint committee on governmental simplification before the voters at the November election.

The city directors of Pasadena on the other hand, forwarded an endorsement of the county manager proposal to the supervisors, and also urged that the second of the four proposals be submitted to the voters at the November election. They reserved judgment on the other proposals, which deal with distribution of the county's share of gasoline tax funds to the 24 cities and the unincorporated area, and, lastly, equalization of burdens and benefits.

Both Glendale and Pasadena have city managers, and are but two of several throughout the county, another being Long Beach.

The Los Angeles county fair grounds will be made practically self-supporting after this year, by action of the board of supervisors in taking \$4956 out of the final budget for the upkeep of the grounds, just before the final budget was adopted, it was stated today.

The county is contributing \$12,000 for the construction of a new metal roof for the old exhibit building, which will last for the life of the building. The roof design also will withstand movement from earth shocks without leaking, according to engineers.

Errands of mercy, with life or death in the balance, are made day and night by ten Los Angeles county general hospital ambulances, which total 1,000 miles every 24 hours in their trips.

The ambulances carry an average of 92 patients every day, one out of every five being an emergency case.

Careful driving by the hospital's 36 drivers has ended in but one minor accident being recorded in the last 200,000 miles of constant travel thru traffic crowded highways.

The cost of transporting 33,667 patients last fiscal year was but \$1.83 each as compared with \$2.28 each for the previous year.
