Lower Permit Fees To Hunt In Mexico

Charges to Hunting Club Members Have Been Reduced

Lower permit fees and more lenient restrictions are being accorded American hunters desiring to try their skill in Lower California and other Mexican states, it is reported to the outing bureau of the Automobile Club of Southern California. The former charge of 80 pesos for a hunting permit has been reduced to 50 pesos when used in only one state. The 50 pesos rate applies to permits good anywhere in Mexico. To qualify for these rates the applicant must be a member of some sort of hunting club in Mexico that has been duly registered with the fish and game department of that country.

Must Obey Laws If the hunter operates only in one state his stay cannot exceed 80 days. The national permit is good for six months. Americans and other foreigners must be governed by immigration regulations and cannot remain longer than is permitted under rules of that department. Specified limits for doves are 15 a day or 50 in the hunting season. The limit for geese is 10 a day or 25 in the season.

Information Available Information governing wild game as well as applications for permits are available at the fish and game department in Mexico. Lower California. The automobile club's outing bureau has compiled a log of Lower California and the Gulf of California listing customs and immigration regulations, locations of hotels, auto parks, trailer space and camp sites, and yachting, fishing and hunting areas. The booklet, available to members, contains a detailed map showing ports of entry, anchorage, lighthouses and types of fish and game to be found at various points.

Tartars Who Will Make It Tough

Treize Is Lost To Tartars for Several Weeks

Veteran Backfield Man Snaps Elbow in First Practice Game

In the first play of the first practice scrimmage of the season Coach Bernie Donahue found himself up against the necessity of revising his whole scheme of football tactics, when Right Half Bobby Treize was taken out of the game with a fractured elbow.

Donahue had built his team around Treize, rated as one of the best quarterbacks in the league last season, but who had been switched to right half this year. Bobby will be out of the line-up for at least four weeks and may not see any action at all this year, which breaks up the original backfield combination.

The loss of their best punter is a cruel blow to the Tartars who were depending on the distance and accuracy of Bobby's boots to get them out of tough holes, and put the opponents on the defensive. It is too late in the season to develop another star, and the Torrance tribe will have to depend on their old fight and passing attack to make their gains.

Donahue has switched Schmid to right half and will use Radford at fullback, and hopes to find that this combination will click as well as his original backfield. Jimmy Amman takes care of the left half position with Louis Madore at quarter.

The Tartars showed up well in their practice scrimmage against Jordan and will go against the Banning squad in a regular practice game tomorrow afternoon.




