### Two Injured As Car Flips Over

Driver Held After Crash Off Catalina Street

An attempt to drive down a steep pathway in a coupe while he was allegedly under the influence of liquor caused Arthur Hale, 32, 831 Maple avenue, Los Angeles, to be arrested Monday afternoon at the Redondo-Hermosa hospital where he and his 13-year-old sister were taken for treatment after Hale's car turned turtle off Catalina street.

The girl, now confined at the county General hospital, is suffering from a fractured skull and is said to be in a serious condition. Hale's arm was broken and he suffered numerous cuts and bruises. Two other passengers in the car, Anna Edwards, 60, 1314 Stanford avenue, Los Angeles, and Billy Hale, 16-year-old brother of the motorist, escaped injury.

After treatment in the hospital, Hale was brought to the Torrance police station by Sergeant Ernest Ashton. He was released on his own recognizance, to appear for trial Dec. 8.

### Japanese Held Negligent for Own Fatality

S. Wada Inquest Precedes Funeral Services On Tuesday

While his widow sat in the chapel with bowed head and a score of his countrymen followed the proceedings intently, the late Shinichi Wada, 56-year-old Lomita farmer, was held a traffic victim of his own negligence by a coroner's jury Monday morning at Stone and Myers mortuary.

Mr. Wada died at Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital Nov. 25 from injuries received when he crashed his car into a machine driven by Mrs. Lula Tory, of Santa Paula. He and his companion, John Younko, who lies critically injured at the county General hospital, had been drinking, it was testified by Capt. John H. Stroh.

Funeral services for the Japanese were held Tuesday afternoon at the A. M. Gamby mortuary in Lomita and interment was at Evergreen park. Mr. Wada was a native of Japan.

On Wrong Side of Road

Convening 40 minutes late, the inquest opened with the customary identification of the victim by Shinjo Wada, a brother who resides in Lomita. James K. Sakai, of Moneta, served as interpreter. Capt. Stroh testified concerning details of his investigation of the crash which imperiled the lives of Mrs. Tory and her two children while they were en route to spend Thanksgiving with a brother in Long Beach.

The officer said skid marks showed the Japanese was driving on the wrong side of the road before and after he reached the intersection of Highway 101 and Hawthorne avenue. Mrs. Tory said she applied her brakes when she saw the car careening toward her while she was driving between 40 and 45 miles an hour on the outside lane of Highway 101. She and her son were slightly injured in the accident.

Members of the jury were Jack Silva, John Rogers, Ed Thompson, W. H. Gilbert, Cal Alverson and C. A. Drury.

### Early Bids Asked To Beat Increase In Steel Cost

Dec. 15 has been set by the board of supervisors for opening bids for furnishing and installing the four steel penstocks, valves and appurtenant structures for the outlet works of San Gabriel dam No. 1, one of the largest dams in the world outside of the Booneville and Wheeler projects under way by the federal government.

By advertising for bids before Jan. 1, the flood control district will avoid an increase in the price of steel that would amount to between \$3,000 and \$4,000 on the work, according to C. H. Howell, chief engineer of the flood control district. The supervisors acted immediately upon receipt of the information from Howell.


The local resident will be assisted by Mrs. Margaret Massie and Mrs. Irene Wilkes, supervisors, and a number of district and state officers are expected to attend.
