SEALID PROPOSALS will be received at the office of the City Clerk, City Hall, City of Torrance, California, until 8:00 o'clock P. M., on December 22, 1936, at which time they will be publicly opened and read for performing work as follows:

BID A—190th Street and Western Avenue improvement consisting of—

1. Grading for widening of present pavement and construction of gutter; estimated excavation 690 cubic yards.

2. Provide and place 135 cubic yards of sand for cushion.

3. Furnish and place 7280 square feet of 6-inch asphaltic concrete pavement; estimated requirement 272 tons.

4. Place 375 lineal feet 2x6 R. O. P. headers.

5. Furnish and place 62 lineal feet 8-inch corrugated pipe; 16 gage.

BID B—For resurfacing and widening pavement along the south roadway of Torrance Boulevard from Western Avenue to 218th Street, consisting of the following work and improvement—

1. Finish grading 1500 square feet, estimated at 150 cubic yards.

2. Furnish and place 1500 lineal feet 2x6 R. O. P. headers.

3. Construct 90 lineal feet of 15-inch concrete curb, 20% lineal feet of reinforced concrete retaining wall requiring 3% cubic yards of concrete.

4. Pave with 6-inch asphaltic concrete 7600 square feet, using 281 tons of concrete and resurfacing with asphaltic concrete 14-inch thick 61,446 square feet of roadway, requiring 462 tons of asphaltic concrete.

Work embraced herein shall be done in accordance with the appropriate provisions of construction details, Sections 10 to 72, inclusive, of the specifications entitled "State of California Department of Public Works Division of Highways Standard Specifications January, 1935," insofar as the same may apply.

No bid will be received unless it is made on a proposal form furnished by the City Engineer. Each bid must be accompanied by cash, certified or cashier's check, or bidder's bond made payable to the City of Torrance for an amount equal to at least ten (10) per cent of the amount bid, such guaranty to be forfeited should the bidder to whom the contract is awarded fail to enter into the contract.

Changes Due In Tax Rebate Measure

Deputy Counsel Informs Co. Supervisors of Legislation

Several changes will have to be made in a legislative bill pertaining to tax rebates, as proposed to the county supervisors by a so-called tax expert, before it could be introduced into the 1937 legislature, Deputy County Counsel J. H. O'Connor told the supervisors this week after examining the plan. The proposal was to provide a means for the county to credit any refunds on 1933-34 taxes against the tax payments of future years.

"In co-operation with representatives from the offices of the auditor, tax collector and treasurer, we have considered the proposed legislation and while we are ready to approve the principle underlying the proposed bill, we believe it should be revised," O'Connor stated.

"We believe you should authorize the county
