### Bank Review Shows West Business Gain

Far Western business activity for the year 1936 was maintained at a higher level than in any of the previous four years, according to the Bank of America's business index appearing in the current issue of the bank's monthly Business Review. The index stood at 83.6 at the year's end, which is the highest point since April 1931, and only 16.4 percent below normal.

Building activity in California contributed heavily to the general speeding up of business in 1936; permits showed 71.8 percent increase over 1935 and the best showing in the past five years.

### Smuggling Once Thriving Industry Of Bay Area Faded With Dry Era

After the Spaniards discovered San Pedro Bay the ancient rule that there should be no trading on shore except by Spanish vessels was put into effect. This was enforced for many years. Toward the end of Spanish rule, however, it became a custom for daring American skippers to sneak in and much smuggling followed, with the Indians, some of the missionaries, and the settlers in and around Los Angeles pueblo. According to old accounts unearthed recently little smuggling was done at the San Diego port because the bay was fortified, although there were no guns.

### Two Weeks Left to Get License Plates for 1937

The deadline for the renewal of license plates is Feb. 4, and there will be no extension this year.

Because the period of grace allowed motorists to obtain new plates has been set by the legislature, the Motor Vehicle Department is without power to grant an extension. Penalties will be collected from those who have not applied for their 1937 plates on or before midnight, Feb. 4.

Plates may be obtained at the temporary branch office of the department at the Redondo Chamber of Commerce, California Highway Patrol offices and from the auto club.

### Were 'Foxy' Lot

Liquor was not the only contraband ferried to these nearby shores. Stories persist of Chinese being dumped on the sands of Portuguese Bend and other Palos Verdes inlets, of narcotics being lugged through the surf, of shipments of arms to South American revolutionaries and entry without benefit of customs of valuable furs, jewels and tapestries from the Far East.

The early-day skippers were a "foxy" lot. They openly sailed into San Pedro under various pretenses, such as: they were whaling, or working under contracts for the Russian government, or looking for sea otters. Their best alibi was that they were at anchor for food and water. Later, under cover of darkness, the smuggling would take place, more often than not abetted by Spaniards and Mexicans ashore. When these smugglers were caught—and often they were—they were fined.

Money paid into the alcade of Los Angeles was given to the Old Plaza church. Almost from the very beginning San Pedro was regarded as part of entry for the San Gabriel Mission, but it was not until 1826, or the beginning of Mexican rule, that it was so officially recognized. Even after 1826 there was much smuggling between ship-captains and those ashore. This was done to avoid the customs duties imposed by Mexico. At one period Catalina was the main base for smuggling operations. All contraband goods were landed there and later ferried over by small boats to various quiet points along the shoreline.
