ASK FOR THESE BOOKS AT THE LIBRARY

Co-op by Upton Sinclair: This is Upton Sinclair's first novel in five years. Abandoning the controversial style of many of his former works he tells the story of a Cooperation in the terms of a people who work in it. The style is like all of Sinclair's writings. The significant part of this book is an argument for workers cooperation as a way to the economy of abundance. Though fictional in treatment the author asserts that all incidents are drawn from actual experience of the 175 self-help cooperatives in California and it is an interesting concrete exposition of the problem, in its modern American setting.

Fair Company by Doris Leslie: The spirit of England in the past 130 years is crystallized in the romantic chronicle of four fair women each of whom typifies her own social and historical period. With swift action and vivid characterization are portrayed the changing modes and customs from the Regency to post-war days. One lives more than fully in the lives of Sabrina, Claire, Charlotte, and "Jill".

My Country and My People by Lin Yutang: One professor and well known author of books on China states: "This is the best book on China in the English language." He says further that he has always believed a truly revealing book could be done on China by a Chinese with a Western background. Lin is a Chinese. He has lived in America, measured the ways of the West with a critical eye. He is widely read in Western culture and understands. He has the mellowness, wisdom, and humor of his race. Pearl Buck recommends it as "the most profound, most complete and most important book yet written about China".

American Acres by Louise Redfield Peattie: This consists of an excellently constructed story in three parts; a beautiful tale of childhood in the country, an American idyll of sheer lily beauty followed by a rootless cosmopolitanism which is disaster to every healthy

Noted Tapestry-Weaver to Exhibit Work at Palos Verdes Art Gallery

The Palos Verdes Community Arts association will present for its next exhibit in the Palos Verdes Art Gallery, the work of one of its own members. On Sunday, Feb. 7, the cartoons and tapestries of Lorenz Kleiser will be on display and will remain until March 5. A tea will be given by the membership committee on the opening day from 2 until 5 o'clock and Kleiser will give a lecture upon his work.

Kleiser was born in this country, spent his youth in Norway and after spending three years in Munich he returned to Norway where he did illustrations and mural paintings. In 1900 he came back to the United States and after several years founded the Edgewater Tapestry looms, making original designs which have gained for him an international reputation. He was a delegate on the Hoover Fine Arts commission to France and has lectured in New York University and the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

He designs the cartoons, paints in oil the preliminary picture and then weaves the finished tapestry. His subjects range from the Gothic to the contemporary and includes such historical events as pioneer activities of the early settlers in western states and the history and up building of cities. Examples of his work are panels for state capitols, churches, libraries, museums and private collections. His largest work, 25 feet long and containing 145 figures, is owned by Harvey S. Firestone.

Famed Woman Violinist Will Appear In L. A.



Erika Morini, Viennese violinist, who is regarded by critics of this country as the foremost woman violinist of the present day, and successor to the great Maude Powell, will be presented in a concert at Philharmonic auditorium, Tuesday evening, February 9 by Merle Armitage, impresario.

Now in her twenties, Miss Morini made her debut with a symphony orchestra at the age of 10. In her teens she appeared in concerts throughout this country and Europe. The artist has an extraordinary repertoire drawn from all schools, but her favorite composers are Bach and Beethoven.

Among the selections announced for her Los Angeles concert are "Praeludium and Allegro" by Paganini-Kreisler; "Sonata in G Minor" by Tartini; "Concerto in D Minor" by Wieniawski; "Rondo" by Schubert and "Rondo Capriccioso" by Saint-Saens. 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County Hospital Has Full Load

Nearly 3,000 Patients Tax Huge Plant's Capacity

Medical treatment was given to 4,582 patients at the Los Angeles county general hospital during the week ending Jan. 31, according to Everett J. Gray, superintendent.

Never in the 59 years that the hospital has been open to the needy of the county has there been such a demand for the services of the staff during a one-week period, Gray reported. The patient load of the hospital at the start of last week was 2,975, and there were 1,607 more patients admitted during the week.

Monday morning, Feb. 1, found 2,922 patients in the huge hospital, which has some 37 acres of floor space, and has been taxed to capacity, with hallway space utilized in some instances.
