**White Point Outfall  
 Sewer Section  
 Near Finish**

Work was nearing completion  
 this week on the submerged sec-  
 tion of the White Point Outfall  
 sewer, which is the  
 scheduled completion date,  
 weather permitting, according  
 to A. K. Warren, chief engineer  
 of the county sanitation dis-  
 tricts.  
 Lining of the tunnel section  
 through the Palos Verdes Hills  
 has been delayed slightly due  
 to heavy rains that flowed into  
 the seven-foot bore at some of  
 the depths. Excavation for the  
 31,000-foot tunnel section was  
 completed last fall, and the  
 United Concrete company, which  
 had the contract for the north-  
 erly link, extending from the  
 treatment plant several hundred  
 feet into the hills, completed its  
 work last September.  
 Warren estimated that the en-  
 tire project was approximately  
 75 percent completed.
